Roosevelt Still Finds Use for the Capital

Paris Newspaper Correspondents Who Saw Him at Naples Intimate That He is Apparently Suffering From an Enlarged Cranium; And Then They Quote Him in an Alleged Interview

Naples, April 6.—After spending yesterday afternoon and evening asleep in Naples when he was given an enthusiastic welcome by the natives of the city Theodore Roosevelt began the second stage of his journey to the East African Protectorate and Uganda. Shortly after midnight last night he boarded the steamer Admiral, which is due at Mombasa April 21st.

Big Strike on Great Lakes

Detroit, Mich., April 6.—(Special)—The marine strike situation hourly grows menacing. The developments of the past 24 hours have been principally in the nature of assertions of loyalty on the part of the mariners toward their union affiliations.

The nature of the oath which all classes of employees are being required to take before they can get a berth with any of the big companies has done much to increase the feeling of resentment among the men. Two documents are submitted, the first declaring that the signer belongs to no union and the second that the signer renounces all allegiance to any and all labor unions and will not join such as long as he follows sailing for a living.
