THIS CHURCH WAS BUILT IN 1765

Interesting Description by a Visitor to St. John Man--It is Located at Barrington Passage.

A St. John man writes to the Times from Barrington Passage, N. S. as follows: "Your correspondent, touring Nova Scotia, had a quaint old church called to his attention and thinking a few notes might be of interest to the Times and its many readers I send you the following: This church is at Barrington, and was built in 1765, being the third oldest in the province. It is an almost square building with pitch roof, the building being 33 feet long and 27 feet wide, and standing today as plumb as the day it was raised. The early settlers brought the frame from the United States. It is of white cedar, the interior of the church presents a finer appearance than the outside and contains the old-fashioned high pulpit gallery on either side of the altar.

FRED WILLIAMS IN CHARGE

The chief Canadian offices of Canada, the illustrated weekly published in London, England, for the promotion of Canadian interests in Great Britain, have been removed from Montreal to Toronto. For the present the headquarters will be in room 33 James building, Young street, later on permanent offices will be opened. The Canadian management of the paper has been assumed by Fred G. H. Williams, for twenty years actively identified with the Canadian daily press and for the past three and a half years a present almost entirely devoted to the United States and other foreign countries. Special attention will also be paid to Canadian industrial and financial interests, with a view of developing trade between the Dominion and the mother country, while the halftone illustrations will be continued on a lavish scale. Canadians who have been in England this summer speak in the warmest praise of the work which the new weekly is doing to interest people in the Dominion and its development.

A printer's error in the entry form showed the price per entry 25 cents; this should read 15 cents per bird as formerly when the feeding was done by the exhibitor. Entries close August 20th, after which date an additional charge is made for entries.

THE DOCTORS MAKE PROTEST

Sensational Onslaught on Religious Pilgrimages to Lourdes. The prospect of the annual pilgrimage to Lourdes, beginning Aug. 15, has, says Paris cables, roused among medical men a protest against the perpetuation of the medieval practice, which, they declare, is not only harmful to the pilgrims themselves, but dangerous to the public health. Prof. Jean de Bonnelon, an eminent opinion on the pathologist of France on the subject, and received 11,221 replies. Of this number an infinitesimal minority, which significantly included the doctors of Lourdes itself, defended the pilgrimage. The remainder, including many eminent and avowed Catholics, denounced the maintenance of the custom as a serious danger to the pilgrims and the community generally. The water, which is supposed to have healing efficacy, is not changed throughout the pilgrimage, and is absolutely filthy. No matter what kind of virulent sores there are on a devotee's body, he is plunged into the water regardless of aggrading contagion. If a medical practitioner did such a thing he would be immediately prosecuted. Furthermore, the trams conveying thousands of diseased persons, on which the most elementary rules of hygiene are violated, constitute a perpetual danger to the pilgrims, subsequent travellers and the residents of the districts through which they pass.
