NO EFFORT TO CONSERVE FOOD "Most people are buying and eating as much as they can pay for. There is no systematic effort to conserve the supply of meat, fish, potatoes or any of those articles which Mr. Hanna says are necessary for shipment abroad to the armies on the battlefields. It is not because the people are unwilling, but they need positive direction. There should be invoked at once a few 'thou shalt nots' in connection with the food control campaign. If meat is scarce and its consumption must be curtailed 'meatless days' be declared. The people need not be feared. They are anxious to make wise and necessary sacrifices to help win the war. They only ask leadership. If there is to be no faltering at the end, the onus is on the premier and his cabinet—not on the people. They are ready to follow where they have done most of the leading."
