Assistant to Vice-President Says Ralway Still Holds Six Million WIFE OF DISTINGUISHED Acres; Steady Flow of Settlers

Montreal, Oct. 31—According to J. S. Dennis, assistant to the president of the C. P. R., and head of that railway's de-Montreal, Oct. 81—According to J. S. Dennis, assistant to the president of the C. P. R., and head of that railway's department of natural resources, the flow of American settlers into Western Canada points since the beginning of the war has been constant and is increasing. He made this statement this morning in answer to questions submitted to him by the Dominion's Railway Commission, sitting in Montreal, to inquire into trade conditions of the Empire.

Commissioner R. Sinclair, of New Zealand, inquired if the American settlers in Western Canada became Canadian citizens in the technical sense of the term, and Mr. Dennis replied that a large number of them became citizens of Canada to this extent that they became naturalized Canadians and took an interest in provincial and municipal politics, but they were not concerned as other Canadians were in the great struggle the Empire was making today.

Tells of Land Graats.

Mr. Dennis said the total land grants to the company were 27,787,921 acres, all situated in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia. There has been sold to date 21,276,527 acres, leaving a balance available for sale of 6,511,394 acres. The sale of the 21,000,000 acres approximately realized \$100,896,817. Some of the land sold had come back to the company their instalments, about 7,000,000 acres.


