"CRIMES OF HONEST PEOPLE" DISCUSSED
An Instance Where Parents Unwittingly Wrong Their Children by Choosing Unsuitable Medicines
(Montreal Mail)
Before a large gathering of the members of the Women's Canadian Club in the Ritz-Carlton yesterday, M. Eugene Brioux, a noted French dramatist and academician, lectured on "The Crimes of Honest People"—crimes, he said, that were committed unwittingly before witnesses who did not remark them, and on victims who seldom raised much protest, for they are weak, children or women or men in a state of inferiority.
The chief crime committed against children in France, said the lecturer, was the choosing by the parents, with out in any way consulting the children, of their vocations, and even their husbands or wives, when the time came. Then there were the crimes against womanhood, suffering heaped upon women in consequence of the laws of the land, and so on. The lecturer dealt with crimes committed against the poor, committed generally by those who were endeavoring to do the impoverished with charity. These, the speaker said, arose from a misunderstanding of the positions of these people. As to crimes committed against the weak, these were generally perpetrated by people of much influence, for instance, some doctors and other people of high position.
M. Brioux concluded by referring to crimes perpetrated against one's country. Politicians, he considered, were guilty of some of these; then there were authors and others who misrepresented their country, creating false impressions of it in other lands. There were many books in circulation, he declared, which are purported to expose social conditions in France as they are, but are very liehous to his country. He stated that he had investigated the origin of many of these and found that a great majority of them were published in Leipzig. "I believe their production is more limited now," he added.

PATRIOTISM OF FRANCE ENDURING
M. Boutroux Says it Manifests Itself Under Different Aspects and Must Always Be French
An article entitled "The Spirit of France," by Emile Boutroux, member of the French Institute and the Academie Francaise, and professor of modern philosophy at the University of Paris, appears in the columns of the London Daily News and Leader. M. Boutroux introduces his theme of patriotism as follows:—
"It was a favorite idea of Hippolyte Taine that men but imperfectly know themselves, that the pressure of circumstances is needed to bring about both in their own eyes and in those of others, what has lain concealed deep in their hearts; and that a man who regarded himself as timid, proves in the hour of trial, to be a hero; whereas another, who considered himself a great hero, is found to be a very ordinary person indeed. This theory appears particularly apt for France. Because we do not keep this in mind, we gibly talk of moral revolutions in such and such a sphere of thought, revolutions, the scene of which frequently is France itself. Of course, France passes through transitional periods, like that everything that lives, but she probably remains herself far more than men of letters affirm.
"French patriotism," continues M. Boutroux, "is independent of any event. It is indissoluble from the genius of France. But at different periods it manifests itself under different aspects. During the Dreyfus affair it showed itself in two distinct forms. Those who called themselves Nationalists, assumed pre-eminently the role of defenders of the French fatherland; they relied mainly on tradition, and, turning their gaze upon the past, required that France should walk back the glorious role in the world which she had played in former times. Others, no less patriotic from their own point of view, were especially eager to emphasize and cause to triumph the ideal of justice and humanity, wherein they saw the very heart of the patriotism of France."
Of the patriotism which animated the youth of France on the outbreak of the present war, M. Boutroux says: "They were happy and proud to feel in accordance with French tradition, that they were not only the soldiers of France but soldiers of the world; not only the defenders of their country, but also the champions of the rights of all nationalities. . . . Our young soldiers' letters tell of a solidarity, a sense of common duty, which effaces all differences of opinion."
Under the necessity of fighting for the very existence of France, M. Boutroux shows that the distinction existing between traditional patriotism and nationalistic patriotism completely disappears. It is only too evident that the preservation of France is necessary for upholding the ideal to which she has consecrated herself. . . . How can we help feeling greater love than ever for this France of ours, which, throughout her whole history, has proved herself a lover of moral greatness, of beauty and generosity? Moral unity has thus been achieved, the heart of France, ever yours!
