

WOUNDED CANADIANS TELL GRAPHIC STORY OF THE GREAT FIGHT

Falkenstein, England, April 26.—All England throbs with pride today at the story of the Canadians' great charge.

The words, "Bravo, Canadians," on one newspaper bill, typifies the general sentiment here.

I am witnessing the other side of the newspaper's endurance. Our first batch of wounded is already here, and others are arriving today.

Canada may rest assured that everything is being done that love, admiration and pity can suggest to ease their lot and help them back to health.

From stories of the wounded men, I am able to piece together part of the story of the fight. After the heavy fighting the Canadians moved around occupying positions north of Ypres.

The Canadians were not alarmed and finished their game and, receiving no orders, retired as usual. At 1 o'clock in the morning they were aroused and called to arms.

The Canadians lay low, saying little. Now and again some irresponsible joker would send a laugh around his circle with some quip.

At this point the personal narrative ceases, for every lad I have spoken to fell before the hill top was reached.

Nothing impressed me more in talking with the boys than their calm matter-of-fact way of doing up the affair.

The men enrolled for service in the Canadian remount depot in England are by this time quartered in St. John's.

Ottawa, Ont., April 27.—Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, is back after inspection of the camps at Spirit Lake, Quebec and Kapuskasing, Ont., where alien enemies are interned. There are 800 in the former and 500 in the latter camp. The men have given no trouble but a strong military guard is maintained. In the winter much land was cleared for the model farms and on a portion of it crops will be put under seed this season. Those interned are nearly all Austrians. Many of them propose to take up home-steads.

SISTER SUSIE, BEWARE!

Knitter's Cramp Now Appearing Among the Patriotic Women of England

London, April 27.—Too much wartime knitting and sewing is responsible for the appearance of a malady which can be compared with writer's cramp or tenosynovitis. The physicians call it "knitter's rheumatism." It affects the upper arm and shoulder rather than the fingers, and seems to afflict those who knit with difficulty, not having practiced the art in their youth. The only treatment is rest and knitting indefinitely.

"When an untrained set of muscles is suddenly called upon to repeat incessantly a complex and unaccustomed sequence of movements," says a London physician, "a spasmodic paralysis is very likely to develop.
