
**Provides For Abolition of
Legislative Council On
May 1 Next**

**MEASURE FILED FOR
ITS SECOND READING**

**Lieutenant Governor And
One Chamber Will Form
Legislature, Plan**

HALIFAX, Feb. 25.—The Legislative Council, the upper chamber of the Nova Scotia legislature, will cease to function on May 1, 1926, if a bill introduced in the Legislative Assembly this afternoon becomes law. Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Premier of Nova Scotia, introduced the bill which is entitled, "An act abolishing the Legislative

Council and amendment of the constitution of the province." Introduction of the bill had been announced previously and the galleries were crowded when Premier Rhodes rose to set in motion the machinery designed to abolish the historic chamber. There was no address on the bill at its introduction and it was filed away to be "read a second time on another day."

WHAT MEASURE PROVIDES

The bill abolishes the Legislative Council and provides that thereafter the Legislature of Nova Scotia shall consist of the Lieutenant-Governor and one House, namely, the House of Assembly.

The Legislative Council at present consists of 18 sitting members. There are three vacancies. With the exception of Hon. F. P. Bligh, recently appointed by the Rhodes government, and Hon. W. H. Owen, appointed in 1881 by the Holmes-Thompson administration, all the members were appointed under a Liberal regime.

In answer to a plan for the abolition of the Legislative Council, privately offered to the Council by Premier Rhodes a few days ago, Hon. Neil Gillis, a member of that body, gave notice of a resolution at yesterday afternoon's sitting to the effect that the council had proved its usefulness, that no real saving would be effected by its removal, and that no monetary consideration should be given against the necessity, more evident now than ever before, of maintaining the council as a branch of the provincial legislature.

TEXT OF BILL

The text of the bill is as follows: 1. The Legislative Council of the Province of Nova Scotia is hereby

abolished, and all appointments and commissions of members of the said council as such, are hereby revoked, vacated and annulled.

2.—The Legislature of the Province of Nova Scotia shall consist of the Lieutenant-Governor and one House, the House of Assembly, mentioned in Chapter 2 of the Revised Statutes of 1923, entitled "Of the Constitution, Powers and Privileges of the House," as amended and the constitution of the Legislature and the Province is hereby altered and amended accordingly.

3.—All powers, jurisdiction, authority and functions which immediately before the enactment of this Act were vested in or exercisable by the Legislature of the Province of Nova Scotia, are hereby vested in and shall be exercisable by the Lieut.-Governor and said House of Assembly.

4.—Sub-section one of Section 2 of the Interpretation Act, Chapter 1 of the Revised Statutes, 1923, as amended, is hereby repealed, and the following is hereby substituted therefor:

(1) The following words may be inserted in the preamble of Statutes and shall indicate the authority by virtue of which they are passed: "By the Governor and the Lieutenant-Governor and the House of Assembly as follows:"

5.—Where and insofar, but insofar only as any provision of any Statute, Act, enactment, law, order-in-council, rule of court, order, by-law, ordinance, regulation, or of any instrument or document whatsoever heretofore enacted, made or executed, is inconsistent with any provision of this Act, such first mentioned provision is hereby repealed and annulled.

6.—This Act shall come into and be in force on the first day of May, A.D., 1926.

A large number of private bills were given second and third readings and the House adjourned after a very short session, to meet again tomorrow afternoon.

SUB-SECTION AMENDED.

7.—Where and insofar, but insofar only as any provision of any Statute, Act, enactment, law, order-in-council, rule of court, order, by-law, ordinance, regulation, or of any instrument or document whatsoever heretofore enacted, made or executed, is inconsistent with any provision of this Act, such first mentioned provision is hereby repealed and annulled.

LABORITES EXPEL TASMANIA SENATOR

**Riled by Attitude Toward
Australia's Law on
Deportation**

LAUNCESTON, TASMANIA, Feb. 25.—Senator James Ernest Ogden was expelled from the Labor party of Tasmania at a conference of the Labor party here today.

The vote was 28 to 21 in favor of his expulsion.

This action of the Labor party is the outcome of Senator Ogden's favorable attitude toward the Australian government's deportation legislation of a few months ago, which was chiefly aimed at Tom Walsh and Jacob Joannesson, respectively president and secretary of the Australian Seamen's Union, whom the Bruce government sought to deport because of their activities in connection with the seamen's strike.

The Australian High Court ruled that the commonwealth parliament had not the legal power to pass the deportation bill and it ordered the release of Walsh and Joannesson, who afterward instituted suits against the Australian government for damages for false arrest and imprisonment.

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


