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

### New York Interests Drill attendance of members as well as several prospective members is expected. For Oil Near Charlottetown

CHARLOTTETOWN, May 20-Owing to the fact that a portion of the casing of the well being drilled had collapsed, the operations of the Doherty interests of New York, in their search for oil in sands below Governor's Island in Hillsboro Bay, about eight miles from here, have been interrupted for some time during the winter pending argival of new equipment to cope with the situation. Although work was resumed several weeks ago the tools stalled in the hole when the casing collapsed have not yet been recovered. The hole is 1,400 feet deep now and the company expects to drill to 6,000 feet, and they anticipate striking oil before reaching that level. At 700 feet they struck coal in small quantities. FORMER SURVEYS CONFIRMED.

The Doherty interests sent their geologists to this province, and their investigations confirmed the surveys made by Mr. MacKay. Accordingly, in October last, they decided to commence their operations on Governor's Island as being one of the likely spots where oil might be struck.

Governor's Island is situated in Hillsboro Bay, about eight miles from Charlottetown and two and a half miles from the mainland. It covers about 100 acres, is lower than the surrounding land and the rock is Permian forming land and the rock is Permian formation. OPERATIONS BEGIN After two or three months taken up in transporting material by barges, the plant was erected; and the drill was officially started on Dec. 1, it being made the occasion of a public function, Premier Stewart setting the drill machine.

STRIKE COAL SEAM At about 700 feet they struck coal in small quantities. This winter they had reached about 1,400 feet when a portion of the casing collapsed, making it impossible to extricate the boring tools. These were cut off and left in the hole, and there was a delay until special "fishing" machinery could be procured from the United States. It arrived two or three weeks ago, and up to the time of writing the stalled tools have not yet been taken to the surface.


