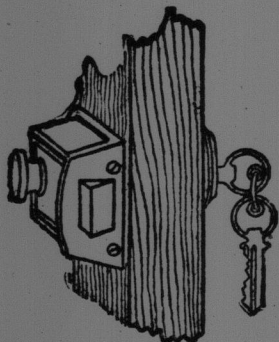

LOCAL NEWS

SIR JOHN EATON HERE.
Sir John Eaton, president of the T. Eaton Company, Ltd., passed through the city today en route to visit his eastern branch in Montreal. He arrived in his private car, which was attached to the Montreal train.

Acting Mayor Frink today received a wire from Mayor Schofield saying that he would be home on the early train tomorrow morning. The regular meeting of the common council, scheduled for this afternoon has therefore been postponed until tomorrow afternoon.

GRAIN HANDLING HERE.

The total amount of grain handled by the C. P. R. in St. John this winter so far amounted to 7,800,000 bushels. Of this amount 6,000,000 has been delivered and there is at present 1,800,000 bushels in their elevators and cars in West St. John. There are also 200 more car loads on their way here. Yesterday 100,000 bushels were supplied to steamers in port.

VERY NEARLY A FATALITY

**C. N. R. Section Crew Jump
From Hand Car a Few
Seconds Before It Is Splin-
tered By Speeding Engine.**

A matter of seconds separated George Gallagher, of Torrvburn, section foreman of the C. N. R., and his crew of three men from instant death in an accident which occurred last week in the rock cutting near Lawlor's Lake, between Brookville and Torrvburn stations. A light engine bound for the city crashed into a hand car on which they were riding toward Torrvburn a few minutes after the men jumped into the ditch on the side of the line.

The place where the accident happened is on a fairly sharp curve with walls of rock towering on either side of the track. The cutting is spanned by a highway bridge at this point. There is a heavy grade towards the city and it was down this grade that the engine was running at a good rate of speed.

The crew had finished some work near Brookville and were on their way to Torrvburn. They were pumping the car by the hand up the grade and the first intimation they had of impending danger was when the head of the engine swung into sight around the shoulder of the cutting. There was immediately a wild jump for safety and a few seconds later the heavy engine crashed into the hand car, splintering it and scattering the tools of the section crew in all directions.

The engine was brought to a stop but not before it had traveled some 200 yards, and the crew returned to the scene of the wreck. Finding that the workmen had escaped with a few slight scratches, it proceeded again on its way. Mr. Gallagher and his workmen are to be congratulated in the hairbreadth escape.

MOTHER WITNESS AT EDMUNDSTON

**Says St. Pierre Was At Home
On Murder Night**

Brother Also a Witness for the Defence Today—Another Speaks of Strangers There in An Odd Auto.

Edmundston, N. B., March 13.—On the resumption of the trial of William St. Pierre this morning, the cross examination of Leo Gillespie was continued. He could not swear that Room No. 8 was occupied on the night of October 12, 1920.

The next witness called by the defence was Francis St. Pierre, brother of the accused. He said he was living at home on last October. He did not know if anyone got a suit of his brother's clothes. The accused had not worn his suit last October. The witness said he is a brakeman for the Transcontinental. He was working on the night of October 11, reached home at 9 a. m., but did not see William. He saw him on the next day.

Counsel for the defence wished to offer in evidence conversation of the accused and his brother concerning the affair, which took place after the body was found. Objection was taken by the Crown and was sustained by the court. A statement made by the accused after he had been arrested was ruled out also. The witness was not cross examined and was on the stand only a short while. Louis Michaud was next called by the defence. He said he resided in Edmundston day on the day on which the body was found he went in front of the garage where the body was placed. He saw two strangers leaving the other garage. They did not stop but kept on going. They went along Canada street pretty fast. They didn't stop. He had seen them before; took notice of them on account of their automobile.

The cross examination he said they were leaving from the old garage, the Fournier garage. He was questioned as to the locations of the two garages. He said the strangers went towards Quebec. One was taller than the other, both were slight. He never saw them standing up. He saw them three times, they were in the automobile each time. The first time he saw them was on Sunday, October 10. He was sitting in the Grand Central hotel, St. Francis street, between 10.30 and 11 a. m. They had a small low auto looking like a racer, many tires on the rear. It had no doors. He did not notice a trunk. He saw the auto again on Sunday afternoon on top of a hill going down to the concrete bridge. His family was with him. The other time he saw them was when they were leaving. Albert Ouellette would know the car and the men. He did not know color of car or if it was dirty.

Prisoner's Mother.

Madame Julie St. Pierre, mother of the accused, was next called by the defence. She said she had been married thirty-five years and was the mother of eleven children. Seven sons were alive. Six were living with her on last October. She knew of the dance that her son and Max Martin were giving on October 11. She went to bed about nine o'clock that night. The accused was not in the house at that time. He came in afterwards. She heard the kitchen door open and asked "Is that you Sam?" He said "Yes." He answered yes. She had been in bed a short time. She was sure it was his voice. He entered the kitchen and went upstairs. She said to go to the dance as Max would be glad. He then went downstairs and right up again. She did not hear him go out again. The next day she pressed William's suit and Francis' suit. The suit of William's was the one he wore on Monday. It was a dark blue suit. She pressed the suit on the afternoon of Tuesday. She pressed them both. She took the suits from the chairs to the kitchen. He or his sister had put them there. There was no blood on either of the suits.

SEEK NEWS OF MISSING VESSEL

J. T. Knight & Co., local shipping agents for the Italian government this morning received a telegram announcing that the Italian steamer Monte San Michele of 10,000 tons deadweight, which sailed from New York on February 2 for Italy has not been heard of since her departure, notwithstanding that American naval and representatives of foreign authorities have been interested in news of her whereabouts. J. T. Knight & Co. have been asked to inform masters of ships at this port of the matter and to see them to communicate any information which may reach them regarding the vessel as well as keeping watch during navigation for possible clues.

EMPLOYMENT IMPROVING.
Judging by the number of applications being received these days at the mayor's office, the situation in the city has improved materially within the last few weeks. The mayor's clerk said this morning that on several occasions he has communicated with men whose names are on his list as unemployed, offering them work, and has been advised that they were working. He said but few new applications have been made recently.

MACHINE GUNS HERE.
Six captured German machine guns which have been presented to the city by the Canadian government are now here. As their disposal was placed in the hands of the mayor at a recent meeting of the common council nothing will be done until the mayor returns to the city tomorrow.

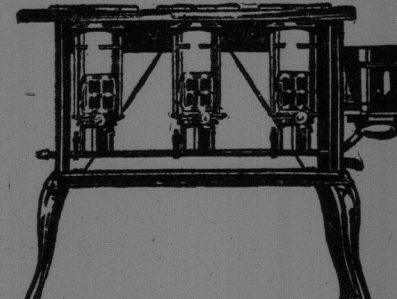
