**OMAA KHAYYAM WON SEASON'S FIRST START**  
Escoba Also Shows Good Performance in Derby Trial  
Wilfred Ylan's Omar Khayyam, recognized by most turfmen as the champion three-year-old of 1917, made his first start of the season at Pimlico and won a mile race. Whether Omar Khayyam is as good as he was last year remains to be seen for George Starr, the only horse entered yesterday which was expected to provide the opposition, was withdrawn and Omar had nothing to beat. The time for the mile was 1:40.2-3 and was far slower than the track record. The Montreal owned horse paid only fifteen cents on the dollar.

The Derby trial was run off at Lexington Monday and Escoba, which along with Sunbriar and Warcloud is most fancied to win the historic classic, was an easy winner. Sewell Combs was second and Viva American third. The time for the race was just one second slower than the track mark for the 1-1/4 miles. Joe Nutter rode Escoba.

Burr Gowrie, winner of the second race at Pimlico, was murdered by Ottawa bettors. He paid twenty to one and several bank rolls were crimped as the result.

Mrs. Kate Leydecker's win was her fourth straight. Outside of Tommy Wase she had little to beat.

Foreground which ran second to Omar Khayyam belongs to Commander J. K. L. Ross and is an imported colt. It was only his second start and he may turn out to be of some account. Commander Ross also started Hill Hampton, another imported colt, but he was unplaced.

Jockey Kummer rode two winners yesterday and it is a tough day indeed that this clever rider does not put over at least one first.

Jockey Erickson, the clever apprentice rider, is on the ground again for rough riding. He is going to spoil his usefulness if he isn't a little more careful. 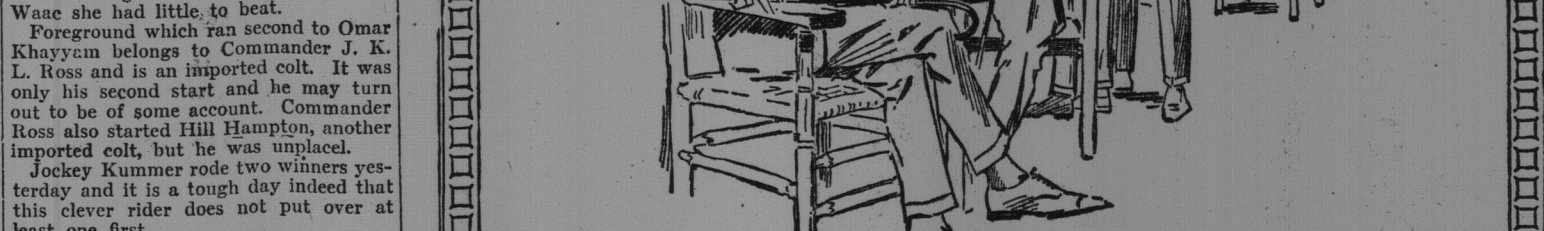
