WHAT THE PLAYHOUSES OFFER

SEAT SALE FOR "ALICE."

WEDNESDAY NEXT.

Next Wednesday at ten A. M. the seat sale for Alice in Wonderland will be held at the Opera House box office. A rush for choice seats—for any night in the week of Nov. 4—will follow as it will be important to ticket-holders to select their locations as early as possible. Everything is going along swimmingly for this big fair musical extravaganza. Miss Leonard the director, arrived back after a three days' trip to Oldtown, Me., last night, where she was superintending the "Alice" show in the Episcopal church. It was a grand success in every way.

Rehearsals for the St. John productions are going on daily in the Keiths, and yesterday afternoon from five to seven o'clock, a rehearsal was held on the Michel stage. Many of these stage rehearsals will take place during the ensuing week. The utmost encouragement is being given this enterprising project by citizens generally. Scores of children and adults who are so fond of the theatre, are flocking to every hand, the public playgrounds sentiment being one in which everybody takes an interest. It has been decided to sell the theatre boxes (four each night) on a subscription basis of \$5, making twenty-four boxes for the week-end. Some applications have already been received.

AROUSING FROM IN GOOD CAUSE

It is the establishment of such an institution that the Halifax Women's Council has in mind. There was some discussion at first regarding the scope of the work, whether it should be local, provincial or maritime, but it was finally decided to concentrate on securing a provincial home, which the government was seen with this object. While the matter was considered favorably, the members of the government felt that the expenditure of the sum involved could be made only in response to a general demand representing the majority of public opinion. The next step was to secure such a volume of public opinion as to create an overwhelming force in favor of the expenditure, and it was to this end that the promoters of the movement were now bending their energies.

League Formed

The Nova Scotia League for the Protection of the Feeble-Minded was formed with headquarters in Halifax. With this as the parent organization, branches of the league were being formed in every city and town in the province. John Wair was appointed as organizer and started his work at the beginning of this month, visiting each town in turn. His work had been most successful. Each branch would do its part in the campaign of education and would also help to organize the public feeling thus aroused to bring pressure to bear on the members of the legislature to pass the required act, and it was hoped that within a short time the demand for the founding of the proposed institution would be so irresistible that it would be no longer delayed.

While this was the chief work in which the Halifax Women's Council were engaged at present, it was by no means the limit of their efforts. The public playgrounds of Halifax were carried on most successfully under their direction and this year four well equipped grounds were conducted with a staff including a supervisor, two teachers for each and instructions in athletics for both boys and girls. The work had
