MAKE GOOD PROFITS IN BEET SUGAR INDUSTRY

**Denmark Farmers' Work of
Special Interest Here Now—
Trouble With Galicians**

Copenhagen, Nov. 18.—One of the most
interesting of agricultural industries in
Denmark is the cultivation of beet sugar.
Substantial profits are reaped by the
farmers, and for many years shareholders
in the Danish sugar refinery companies
have received dividends of 25 per cent. and
more. The only drawback is that labor has
to be imported from Galicia, the Dan-
ish peasantry declining to work in the
beetfields, and as many as 25,000 Galician
men and women arrive in Denmark for
the seed time and remain until the har-
vest in October.

The Galicians spend only a fraction of
their earnings for meals, and they have
their presence in the country is not de-
sired. On being paid they immediately
send all their wages home by post, and
without a cent in their pocket, and
absolutely without any means of subsist-
ence, the authorities have consequently to
pay their return fare.

Thousands of these cunning Galicians
have this year played this game at the ex-
pense of the Danish taxpayer, and the
government has promised to consider what
steps should be taken. It is suggested that
the farmers should deduct from the final
payment the amount necessary for the
double fare, but against this is to be placed
the fear of the Galicians causing a riot
if they are not permitted their wages in
full. It is possible that a special act of
parliament may have to be passed to deal
with the question.

SUNDAY DESPATCHES TELL OF FIGHTING AT TCHATALIA RENEWED

London, Nov. 17.—The negotiations for
an armistice have failed and the Balkan
fleet participated today the attack against
the Turks all along the Tchalatalia lines.
The heavy artillery duel continued through-
out the day.

It appeared to be a Bulgarian prepara-
tion for an infantry attack. The Turkish
fleet participated vigorously in the de-
fence at the Marone, end of the line, and
presumably Turkish warships assisted
the British fleet in the attack.

Nazim Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-
chief, in a despatch this evening, claims
to have repulsed the Bulgarian attack and
destroyed three Bulgarian batteries.

No news of the battle has been received
as yet from Sofia and no information as
to the strength of the forces engaged on
either side.

Nazim Pasha's headquarters are near
the Hademken railway station. According
to the latest reports the battle ceased
with nightfall.

The Bulgarian government organ Mir,
reverts to the subject of peace and plain-
ly intimates that the allies are prepared
to consider the question of an alliance
with Turkey, provided the latter promptly
accepts their terms, which would give
Turkey the opportunity of welding her
territories into a modern state and mak-
ing friends of her conquerors.

The Balkan states clearly have in mind
the formation of such an alliance as would
be able to defy European interference in
the disposal of the spoils of war.

Every day brings fresh despatches re-
garding the terrible spread of cholera. It
is now stated that there are a thousand
cases daily, with a mortality of fifty per
cent, which the Turkish authorities are
impotent to take any measures to prevent
its further spread.

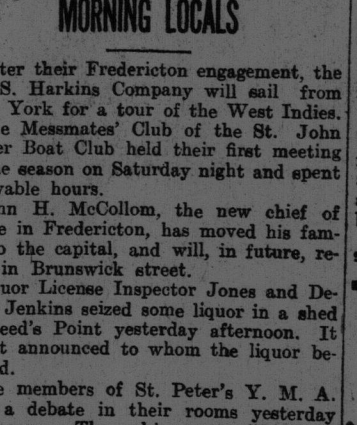
