THE DOOM
It is believed that J. J. Ritchie, K.C., of Halifax, a former law partner of Hon. E. L. Borden, will be appointed judge of the Supreme Court of the province in succession to the late Chief Justice Laurier. Hon. J. D. Hazen was to leave Ottawa today for Washington to confer with Ambassador Bryce and members of the United States government with reference to the regulations governing the North Atlantic fisheries of Canada and Newfoundland. George North a dealer in diamonds in the Maiden Lane jewelry district in New York was yesterday robbed of a wallet containing "sparklers" valued at \$1,000. Two men jumped from a taxicab at the corner of Broadway and 14th street and threw a package at him on the head and relieved him of the wallet. Wm. Dougherty a messenger for a business house was robbed of the firm's payroll \$340. Messengers and others carrying money or valuables are now taking the precaution to carry revolvers. The friends of six men interdicted in Portland, Me., some time ago by His Lordship Bishop Walsh, say that the restriction of the bishop has been sustained by the government to obtain the consent of the imperial authorities to enter the Canadian Confederation. Four foreigners yesterday executed in Chicago for the murder of a truck farmer last fall, while Thomas Jennings, a negro, was hanged for the murder of Clarence Miller. Two men, heavily masked and armed with revolvers, late yesterday afternoon entered the office of the Standard Chemical Co. in Johns street, Toronto, and held up George Ross, superintendent and his assistant, J. W. Nevo, securing about \$400. They made their escape.

There is possibly no literary classic better known than this work of Browning in which he presents in his inimitable manner the result of vanity. Edouard Rondil Wins
New York, Feb. 16.—Edouard Rondil, the amateur billed champion of Europe won his first game in the international 18.2 ball line championship tournament here yesterday. In an exciting finish he defeated C. F. Conklin of Chicago, winner of this title last year, by the score of 400 to 371. Rondil averaged 9.22, with high runs of 83, 82 and 36, and averaged 9.24, with high runs of 80, 83 and 24.
The Frenchman's style was peculiar, he gathered the caroms all over the table seemingly without dependence upon the short ball or nursing. He ran up 218 in 12 innings.
J. Ferdinand Egeberg of the Liechtenstein Club set all the season's high runs and average records when he totalled 92 at 18.2 ball line and averaged 16 in his game against Dr. L. L. Mill of Morris-town, whom he defeated, 400 to 270. His break of 89 displaced the tournament high run mark of 84 by Joseph Mayer and the best run of the recent national championship of 88 by Percy Collins of Chicago.

Benedict Knocked Out
Lewiston, Me., Feb. 16.—Jack Serrino of Boston knocked out Al. Benedict of New York in the third round of the second six-round bout in City Hall last night. Serrino was the aggressor and kept Benedict on the defensive. Of the nine rounds fought every one was Serrino's. In the second round Benedict was knocked to the mat by a clean right to the jaw and took the count of nine. Again in the sixth round Serrino knocked the Boston man down twice and the last time the bell saved him.
In the first round of the second bout Serrino knocked his man down, where he remained for the count of nine, and a succession of short-arm punches in the round put Benedict down and out.

News of the Boxers
Jack Johnson has had built in the rear of his stable a miniature gymnasium where he can train. Johnson had a hard time trying to locate a place where he would be allowed to don the gloves, and in using his own place he thinks he has outwitted the authorities. Johnson admits that he needs the exercise, and he must have it at any cost in view of the match he has in sight with Flynn.
K. O. Brown is said to have been offered a guarantee of \$75,000 to go to Paris to fight a French lightweight to be selected by the club placing the match. Sullivan asked \$3000 to fight any middleweight in Paris, but he was told that it would be one of the boxers that would not go to Paris.
Kid Bitens who held Paeky McFarland off for ten rounds and Jack Goodman rival New York lightweight, will meet in New York next Tuesday night in a 10-round bout.
Al. Palmer the New York white hope, has been sick since he whipped Salter White in New York last Tuesday night. Palmer is said to have been ill previous to entering the ring and has been advised by his physician to lay up for at least a month before he engages in another bout. George Chip, a middleweight, who knocked out Walter Coffey's under the management of Jimmy Dime of Newcastle.
