

"In Scotland the death rate from tuber-culosis had fallen from 19 per ten thousand in 1887, to 12 per ten thousand in 1906. In England, the rate fell from 16 to 11 during the same period. In Ireland, where the work was not so systematised pr vigorously carried on during that time, the death rate remained very nearly untouched, thus showing that the decrease was due to persistent and well-directed effort and not to accident. In New York, during the same period, the death rate fell from 36 per ten thousand to 24 per ten thousand; and a report on the work in , Boston tells us that in 1903, when they in had only one White Plague hospital con- Mass. taining 79 beds, the death rate stood at read a 21.10 per ten thousand; while in 1909, when the means of combating the disease were much more adequate, it had fallen to 17.21 per ten thousand— a reduction of nearly eighteen per cent. in six years. 


