

# SPORT NEWS GLEANED FROM WORLD'S CENTRES

## SOMMERVILLE, OF ST. JOHN, LEADS BOWLERS AT EASTPORT TOURNAMENT

Burpee, of Eastport, Tied World's Record Yesterday With 421.

The second day of the tournament for the Brunswick-Baker-Collender trophy, emblematic of the championship of the Maritime Provinces and Eastern Maine, held on Brown's alley in Eastport, brought out some of the most sensational rolling ever witnessed in these parts. One world's record was tied by Harry Burpee, lead-off man for Eastport, who ran up a total of 421 for three strings, while the grand totals of some of the teams are considered as good if not better than ever rolled by any team in the world in candlepin competition. The series ended with Black's and Eastport tied for honors.

Black's alley team of this city led in total pinfall, with 7,676 for five games, and were the only quintette to have an average of over 1,500 per game. Eastport, defenders of the trophy, finished second, with 7,464, with an average of 1,492 per game. Sommerville of Black's carried off the prize for the highest average for the series, running up a remarkable total of 1,641, for an average of 109.416. Burpee of Eastport, who tied the world's record of 421 for three strings, carried off the single string prize with his 182, and also the prize for the highest three strings.

There was only one bowler out of the 52 participating who went under 80 average, Smith of Calais, who only took part in three games. Nine of the competitors had over 100 average.

Those attending Faber state that he will be able to take his place on the mound again at the end of a week, and it is hoped that he will regain his former effectiveness.

All members of the baseball team must meet with the executive at the office of city stable, Wednesday evening, April 30, at 7:30 sharp.


### GREG TO DEFEND HIS BOXING TITLE

In the other bout in this class, Ernest, Halifax, knocked out Orr, Dalhousie University. ## Turf Notes Of Local Interest

The veteran Combination Park trainer, Frank P. Fox, is making ready for a transfer from the Bedford, Mass., track to the Maine state fair grounds at Lewiston, Me., where he will get ready for his Maine and New Brunswick circuit campaign.

The Vervolo stallion, Roy Volo, 2:08 1/4, who holds the maritime four-year-old record—2:10, 2:08 1/4, 2:11 1/4, at Fredericton in 1921—will be in the stud this year at O'Leary, Prince Edward Island. From the time he took his four-year-old record of 2:10 in 1915, and including last season, Roy Volo has proven himself one of the best race horses in the maritime province. Already, he is a proven sire, his four-year-old son, Jack Volo, 2:21 1/4, being second in the 2:15 1/4 last year at Houliou.

Baron Atta, 2:06, top liner of the 1918 Bay State circuit campaign, was mercifully put to death recently at Greenfield, Mass. The noted Oakland Baron pacer although only twelve years old and in fair flesh was so afflicted with ankylosis (ankle trouble) that destruction was necessary. In the heyday of his racing glory, Baron Atta was owned by John A. McGreggor of Athol, Mass., but the Oakland Baron's transformation from a discredited trotter into a top pacer was due to the efforts of trainer "Eddie" Rowe. The gelding died the property of Roger Rouke. At one time at the dispersal of the W. Starr Lee estate, Baron Atta sold for \$5,100 at auction.

### These Cigars Each Held Drink

Providence, April 24.—Although the cigars sold by Benjamin Robinson, colored, bore gaudy bands, police officials could not understand why patrons paid him 50 cents apiece for them. Finally, they arrested Benjamin and claimed some of the cigars as evidence. Then they found out.

Challenger for Heavyweight Title Getting Ready for Madden.

Harry Wills, New Orleans negro challenger for the world's heavyweight title, has entered hard training for his scheduled fifteen-round bout against Bartley Madden, west side veteran, which will be the feature at the opening of the Queensboro Stadium, Long Island City, May 12.

Wills, determined to fight himself into condition for a bout against Jack Dempsey in the latter's only ring appearance this year, has expressed confidence in his ability to score a knockout over Madden. The west side heavyweight, however, is equally confident he will surprise Wills and the latter's followers and, to this end, is reported in strict training at his quarters in Pompton Lakes, N. J.

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## TIMELY TIPS TO AMATEURS

The critics insist, and rightly so, that the lively ball is making base running—the big thrill of baseball—a lost art. Every player has a certain hobby. While I like my base hits as well as the next fellow, still I get even greater satisfaction in outwitting the catcher, often by getting the break at the expense of the pitcher.

Perhaps the value of the steal has been greatly minimized, yet the knack of getting a big lead is still a great advantage to my way of thinking. In most cases the difference between out and safe at a base is a matter of a step or less. It is possible to gain that step by acquiring the art of being able to take a big lead and still get back safely. It is a feature that is being overlooked by most players. Don't dog the bases when you get on.

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## OFFER \$11,000 FOR WRESTLING BOUT

Tempting Bid for World's Title Bout Between Lewis and Stasiak.

Boston, April 24.—"Going up" is the story of the bidding for the championship match battle between Ed Lewis, holder of the title, and Stanley Stasiak, the Polish challenger. There have been some four figures and big percentage bids to date, but Tom Law, the Wichita, Kan., promoter, has 'em all faded.

He has wired to Messrs. Paul Bowser and Billy Sandow that he will give a guarantee of \$11,000 with 60 per cent of the gross receipts for a scrap in Wichita on Memorial Day, May 30.
