SAYS MANY OUT OF WORK IN BOSTON

C. N. R. Official, Here Today, Speaks of Visit There.

Unemployment in Boston is widespread at present, F. W. Robertson, general passenger agent C. N. R. at Moncton told a Times-Star reporter while passing through the city at noon today from Boston enroute home. While building was going on actively in the big city, Mr. Robertson said he was told that the army of unemployed was quite large and there appeared no immediate prospect for relief.

Mr. Robertson was in Boston securing advance information on what the Maritimes might expect in the way of tourist traffic this year and he found an encouraging view was held by W. J. Gilkerson, C. N. R. passenger agent at Boston, with whom he conferred. Mr. Robertson said that a large number of inquiries had been received at the Boston office from prospective tourists and judging from this, C. N. R. authorities there were inclined to think that this would be an even bigger year than last year for the Maritimes.

While in Boston, Mr. Robertson also conferred with H. H. McInnes, formerly at Moncton and now at Montreal, and with other C. N. R. officials.

ANOTHER DELAY IN CHURCH UNION

Consideration of Bill Goes Over Till Thursday of Next Week.

Ottawa, May 28.—The battle over the Church Union bill in the Commons' Private Bills Committee was postponed till Thursday of next week. The proceedings lasted only a few minutes.

As soon as the committee was called to order Chairman McGivern asked G. W. Mason, K.C., of counsel for the bill, what had been the result of the conferences between the two sides over the amendments regarding non-concurring congregations and non-concurring members which were submitted yesterday.

"There are several crucial points," replied Mr. Mason, "on which we are unable to agree. There are several points on which we agree in principle but for lack of time could not arrive at the necessary phraseology." Adjournment was then made.

NEW INDUSTRY FOR GLEN FALLS

Milk Pasteurization Plant to be Established in Pugsley Building.

Announcement of the establishment of another industry in Glen Falls was made this morning by N. C. Geldert, who said to report on the purchase of a pasteurization and milk delivery plant in one of the buildings on the Pugsley property, formerly occupied by the Ford company of Canada as an assembly plant. Although the output, he anticipated, would be small at the beginning, he said he had every hope of rapid expansion. On taking the matter up with farmers in the district, including those along the Great Marsh, on the Golden Grove, Torryburn and Loch Lomond roads, he said that many of them expressed their intention of enlarging their herds or of acquiring new milk cattle.

Russian Soviet Shows Clemency

Moscow, May 28.—The all-Russian central executive committee has ordered suspension of the execution of 17 former judges, court officials, lawyers and persons connected with the operation of the new economic policy, who were sentenced to death on Saturday after being tried on charges of corruption and bribery in connection with fraudulent granting of legal immunity to prisoners.

MEETING OF INTEREST.

Dr. Gordon Bates of Toronto, secretary of the Canadian Council of Social Hygiene, who left last night for Halifax, will return to St. John tomorrow morning. He has been prevailed upon to remain over in this city for another day to address a big meeting which will be held in the health centre on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. Hon. Dr. W. P. Roberts, minister of health for the province, said this morning that all phases of city life would be represented, as members would be present from practically every organization in the community having to do with this and allied work. The gathering, he anticipated, would be unique in this respect.

(Continued from page 1.) trymen of his had a contract and said their option expired a month ago.

"The latest British offers have been insufficient," he said. "I'm going to wait until the afternoon. If no satisfactory proposition is forthcoming from my own country, I will sign a contract with a French firm at Lyons." The French firm to which he referred, headed by M. Royer, insists Matthews has already signed contracts providing for delivery of the diabolical ray to France.

Matthews, after interviewing Royer's representative here and finding that the British had started action in the French courts to restrain him from selling his secret in France, disappeared and all it is believed he has gone to Lyons.

The inventor's position is that the French ray is sufficient to enable him to go on with this and other inventions, while the British was so small he would have had to "disclose" the secret without assurance of future compensation.

A full statement regarding Grinelli Matthews' death ray was promised for publication in the House of Commons. Meanwhile the newspapers publish a large advertisement in which Matthews gives a testimonial for a vacuum cleaner from this, "I am engaged in arduous mental work."

Slander Action Hearing Later

CONTRACT GOES TO SUSSEX MAN

W. F. Lutz to Build New Sackville Telephone Exchange.

The contract for the erection of a new exchange building at Sackville has been awarded by the New Brunswick Telephone Co. to W. F. Lutz, of Sussex. The building will cost between \$18,000 and \$24,000, and it is the intention to have work on it commenced immediately. The structure was planned and will be put up under the direction of F. Neil Brodie, architect, of this city.

The Telephone Company has started laying a conduit for underground cables through Fairville, extending from the railway crossing near the Simms factory to Barnhill's corner. Excavations for this work are now being carried out. The company is carrying out this operation in anticipation of the roadway in this section being paved in the near future.

MURDOCK CHARGES BEFORE COMMITTEE

The Minister Was Present and Solaced Himself With His Pipe.

Ottawa, May 28.—Investigation into the charges against Hon. James Murdock opened before the Committee on Privileges and Elections of the House this morning, with a short, sharp tussle over the oath taken by a Privy Councillor.

The committee met under the chairmanship of Joseph Archenbald of Chambly-Vercheres and, owing to the number of other committees sitting, had to wait for a quorum. Throughout the proceedings Mr. Murdock sat in a corner of the room, puffing away at his pipe. The charge declares that two days before the failure of the Home Bank Mr. Murdock withdrew his deposit from the Ottawa branch of the bank, using information he had received as a minister.

When a quorum had been obtained the chairman urged the importance of the committee. He pressed that the proceedings should be conducted in a judicial manner, and expressed the gratification he felt at the sober tone adopted by Mr. Porter in making his charges before the House.

Mr. Porter submitted a list of witnesses he wished to have called when the committee meets again next Wednesday. The witnesses were R. P. Gough, Toronto; J. F. M. Stewart, Toronto; Hon. James Robb, Hon. G. P. Graham, Premier; King, Hon. T. A. Low, S. Casey Wood, Toronto.

MONCTON WANTS POST OFFICE. Moncton is out for a new post office and at the last meeting of the City Council a resolution was adopted to be forwarded to Ottawa asking that this work be undertaken. It is pointed out in the resolution that the present building was erected in 1885 when the population of the city was only about 6,000, that since that time the population has grown to 29,000 and that the building is out of the way of about 75 per cent of the residents as well as being too small adequately to serve the city.

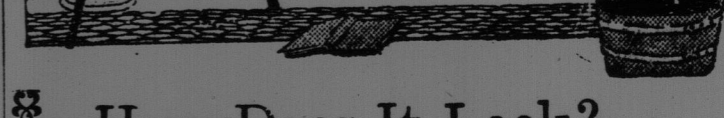
