A large audience in the Portland Methodist church hall last night was present at the illustrated lecture on "Germany without the Kaiser and his

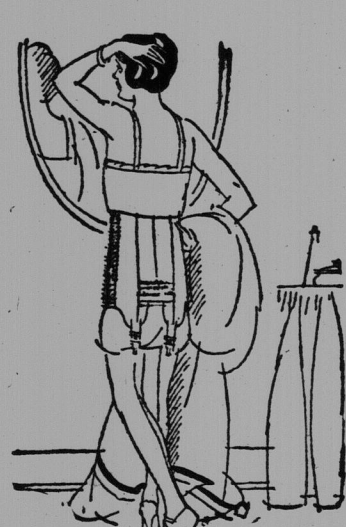
