#### RECENT DEATHS

**Mrs. Rebecca Chatman Jones.**  
The death of Mrs. Rebecca Chatman Jones, relict of Frederick H. Jones, conspicuous in this community as bandmaster and military man, came not only as a shock to friends and acquaintances Sunday but even to those of her immediate family who were in the house with their mother. Mrs. Jones passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Edgar P. Logan, with whom she was visiting, following a stay at a country home of another daughter, Mrs. William H. Charlton. Death was due to paralysis, the fatal stroke being the second in five months. After the first attack, the effects of which was nursed away at the home of Alfred E. Jones, a son, the late Mrs. Jones became able to visit about amongst her children again and the family was greatly encouraged with their parent's apparent recovery to a measure of activity.

Mrs. Jones was seventy-three years of age and lived just ten years longer than her respected husband. She leaves the following children: Mrs. C. H. Henderson, of New York, who arrives today; Frederick C. Jones, now of Los Angeles, (Cal.); Arthur L. (Clew) Jones, of the Furness-Withy's Boston agency; William H. Jones, chief of the caretaking staff of the local military buildings—a post at one time held by his father—and Alfred E. Jones, musical director of the Imperial Theatre. The daughters living in St. John are Mrs. Logan and Mrs. Charlton. Of benign and kindly disposition Mrs. Jones was beloved by a wide circle of friends, enjoying the affectionate address of "Grammy" from many in no wise related to her.

During the late F. H. Jones' term as bandmaster with the British forces in India following the mutiny—in which Mr. Jones fought as a young unmarried man—Mrs. Jones was with her husband, journeying there a number of years. Two of the children were born in the far-off land. The others were English born. It has been more than thirty years since the late F. H. Jones brought his family to Canada from the Old Country, most of which time they have spent in St. John. As bandmaster of the 62nd Regiment not only the late F. H. but his sons as well became prominently identified with the musical activities of this community, a legacy of talent to which this city has fortunately fallen heir.

#### Mrs. J. W. Daniel.

The death of Mrs. Jessie Porteous Daniel, wife of Senator J. W. Daniel, occurred at her home, 148 Princess street, early yesterday morning. Mrs. Daniel had been in failing health for some years and during the last few months had been confined to her home. She was a woman of unusual literary and musical ability and greatly beloved by her friends. At one time she was organist of Centenary church but resigned that position at the time of her marriage. Mrs. Daniel was a daughter of the late John Ennis, a merchant of this city. **Rev. Joseph A. Mulry.**
