

### A Queer Story

The following story is going the rounds of the European press:-  
During the occupation of Northern Germany by the French in 1813, the young Count Lundy was a lieutenant in the army which occupied the department of Elbe, of which the city of Hamburg was the centre, and where Marshal Davout, Prince of Eckmuhl, resided with a terror and cruelty, which even now is but too vividly remembered by the "olden inhabitant." Step by step he rose, until at last he himself became a master barber, and practised as such in his native city. The terrible fire of 1842, which reduced two-thirds of the place to ashes, brought great activity into the building trade, as a natural consequence; and Mr. Lundy, combining the work of contractor and house proprietor with his profession, gradually became a rich man, and a new one of the most extensive contractors in Hamburg. His name is now known to all, and he is still alive.
