- Q. 105 Do you know the accused?
- A. 105 Yes, Sir.
- Q. 106 What is his name?
- A. 106 Corporal Lee. (Pointing to the accused)
- Q. 107 Can you tell me where Corporal Lee was working recently?
- A. 107 Yes, Sir, he was at Prisoner of War Camp 17, one and a half miles off the railroad, off mile 46.
- Q. 108 How many miles from Thurso by rail?
- A. 108 It's about 48 miles, roughly.
- Q. 109 What was there?
- A. 109 Prisoner of Wars; a camp for prisoners of war.
- Q. 110 Of what nationality?
- A. 110 German prisoners, Sir.
- Q. 111 What were they doing?
- A. 111 They were employed by the labour project; at the time, they were working at a right of way for the railroad.
- Q. 112 Who pays them?
- A. 112 We operate a contract with the Department of Labour. The prisoners are not actually paid anything, but they are credited with a certain amount according to the contract.
- Q. 113 Who gives them instructions as to the work they do?
- A. 113 A civilian guard there is in charge of the work.
- Q. 114 Whom are they employed by?
- A. 114 By the Department of Labour, under the supervision of the Company.
- Q. 115 Who is their supervisor on behalf of the Company?
- A. 115 Mr. Gordon Mielke.
- Q. 116 Did you yourself see the accused up there?
- A. 116 Yes, Sir.
- Q. 117 When did you see him the last time?
- A. 117 I cannot say definitely; I don't know.
