Rev. R. B. St. Clair Convicted.
Toronto, Sept. 27.—Rev. R. B. St. Clair was found guilty yesterday morning by Judge Denton, of the charge of circulating and having in his possession indecent literature. Sentenced was suspended.

In passing the suspended sentence on Mr. St. Clair, Judge Denton stated that the ends of justice would be met if Mr. St. Clair put up a \$200 cash bond to refrain from publishing like pamphlets in future. It is possible, however, that Mr. St. Clair will refuse to put up the bond and allow sentence to be passed. Mr. Raney, counsel for the defence, will appeal the case.

IN LEG OF TABLE

Toronto Detective Finds Stolen Jewels Hidden Away.

THREE BURGLARS CAUGHT

Detective Wallace, After a Piece of Shrewd Work, Discovers Thousands of Dollars' Worth of Watches, Rings, Silk, Pipes and Other Articles Ingeniously Concealed—Robberies Occurred Tuesday.

Toronto, Sept. 26.—Mainly through the clever work done by Detective Wallace, the three men responsible for the burglarizing of Follett & Cox's jewelry store at 776 Yonge street, last Tuesday night, were arrested yesterday afternoon. Two of them, "Bubbles" Little and William Snow, were apprehended at 65 West Queen street, and the other man, Oliver Brown, was caught by Detectives Montgomery and Taylor in the Kirby House. The arrests took place about three o'clock in the afternoon.

Wallace and five other detectives were put on the case. It was up to the department to get these "thieves," and they made good. Wallace, through a friend, heard that certain individuals were suspected. A number of names of men known by the police as denizens of the underworld in Toronto were gone through. The list was gradually brought down to about a dozen, and then, through a series of eliminations, six men were sized up as the probable perpetrators of the theft. Wallace knew that Snow used to live on North street in a house almost directly opposite the rear of the place used by Follett & Cox. As Snow had figured in other deals of a like kind in the city, suspicion naturally attached itself to him and friend. The supposition was correct, and when Wallace and three other detectives went to the house on West Queen street yesterday afternoon they found Snow and two other men there as well as Snow's wife and a man named Reginald Lovett, who were both locked up on a charge of vagrancy.

All the jewelry stolen from the store was recovered. It aggregated \$2,000. The jewelry was found in the hollow leg of one of the tables, wrapped up in a lace curtain. There were 34 lockets, 54 bracelets, 12 watches, 61 rings, 45 watch chains, 63 other chains, 10 brooches, 19 stick pins, 20 ladies' guards, 21 necklets and much other jewelry.

TO ASK FOR CENSORS.

Moral Reformers Want All Plays In Canada Purified.

Toronto, Sept. 27.—Premier Borden is to be asked by the Dominion Moral Reform Council of Canada to have an act passed for the appointment of a Dominion board of censors to report on every play and act given at any theatre in the Dominion by any company, troupe, or association. This was recommended by Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore, at the annual meeting of the board of temperance and moral reformers of the Methodist Church in Canada, which met at the Metropolitan Church yesterday. Delegates were present from all over Canada and Newfoundland. Rev. Dr. Carman and Rev. Dr. Chown presided alternately.

The board decided to establish a monthly magazine to fight the white slave traffic. It will be edited by Rev. Dr. Moore. The periodical will also emphasize the duties of citizenship.

In view of the great and growing needs of the work throughout the whole field, it was recommended that three field secretaries be appointed under the general secretary. One will reside in the west, one in the east and one in Ontario. Dr. Moore reported that in co-operation with other denominations, a social survey had been made in Montreal by a lady expert from the United States. Much valuable information was secured regarding the moral conditions, labor problems, public amusements and this evidence it is proposed to base further action.

A moral survey will be made in other Canadian centres also in smaller towns and as far as possible in the rural districts.

A lively discussion took place over tobacco growing in southwestern Ontario. A motion was finally adopted endorsing the action of the London conference, which urged all Methodists in the district to strive to repress the growing of tobacco and to discourage its use in every possible way.

WILLIAM BELL DEAD.

Founder of Piano Company Killed by Train at Guelph.

Guelph, Sept. 27.—Grand Trunk section men yesterday morning found the body of William Bell, badly mutilated, on the tracks about 180 miles east of the city. Identification was made by papers found in his pocket. Mr. Bell was the founder of the Bell Piano & Organ Co. of Guelph, and was eighty years of age. He had left home yesterday afternoon about 2.30. His family were under the impression when he did not return that he had gone on to Toronto. Just how he met his death will probably never be known. Coroner Owen decided an inquest unnecessary.

Mr. Bell was prominently identified with the activities of Guelph and several other places. He established the Bell Piano Works in 1865. He had been president of the Guelph Junction railway, and was a director of the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Co. when Sir John A. Macdonald was its president. He had also been president of the Traders Bank of Canada. He leaves a widow and one son, W. J. Bell, Guelph, and a daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) W. B. Kennedy of Guelph.

Lighting Destroys Barn.

Belleville, Sept. 27.—At an early hour yesterday morning the village of Madoc and the immediate vicinity was visited by a severe electric storm. A barn belonging to Christopher Henderson, in Madoc Township, near the village, was struck and burned to the ground; also some outbuildings. The season's crops, with some farming implements, were destroyed.

Bricklayers Strike at Regina.

Regina, Sept. 27.—The bricklayers went on strike yesterday morning for an increase of 2 1/2 cents per hour. One hundred and fifty men are out and all building is at a standstill as a result. The men now receive 67 1/2 cents per hour.

Uncle Sam's Job.

Senator Swanson of Virginia says that undeserving men often receive government jobs. Their attitude is like that of old Uncle Sam, who has been seen for several days patiently sitting on the bank of the Rappahannock river, near the dam, holding his shotgun in his hand. Finally he attracted the attention of a passerby, who asked:
