REMARKS.

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CHINESE SHIP STRAW.

It may be of interest to know that the work on the Chinese Ship Railway, which commenced last fall with a force of about 300 men, will be pushed forward as soon as the spring opens with largely augmented crews of men, who will be employed both day and night. As large a sum as \$2,000,000 will be expended and about 10,000 men will be employed. It has been said, "the commercial hell of the province." The capital of the company is \$5,000,000 and the work is to be completed under heavy penalties, by the first day of Sept. 1890. The railway will be seven miles in length and perfectly straight. The gradient will be virtually level, some exceeding the ratio of one in 1,000. There is to be a lock at each end of the line where vessels will be received in 1900 vessels previous to transportation. The dock at the anchor end will be 300 feet long, 200 feet wide, 40 feet deep with 20 feet of water at low tide. Connecting with this will be the lifting dock—250 feet in length, and 60 feet wide and will take in the largest paddle wheel steamers plying in the Gulf or Bay. None of the designs for a canal ever contemplated the passage of paddle wheel steamers. In this respect the ship railway offers a great advantage. In each of the locks there will be erected an hydraulic lift, somewhat similar in construction to those at the Victoria docks on the Thames and at Malta. These lifts are especially designed to raise loaded steamers with absolute safety. A ship carriage or cradle resting on wheels and divided with light blocks and hinges will be first placed on the rails which rest on the girders. The girders which are actually a portion of the railway, is lowered with the cradle with the lifts changed until a dividend of 10 c. per share have been paid on the capital stock of \$5,000,000. It is estimated that 600,000 tons of merchandise will pass over the line every year, and that will require an equal amount of registered tonnage to carry that amount. When this railway is completed two years hence, Amherst will become a great manufacturing and commercial center. The centre of many attractions—is the railway, the historical associations of Beauséjour, the Joggins shore, the Bay of Fundy, the coal mines, the experimental farm, etc. But then it will be the location of the only ship railway in the world. Thousands of people will come to see it. Imagine a steamer of 1000 tons sailing majestically up the wide waterway, floating into the dock at the point, being quickly lifted upon the rails, and being immediately hauled by two locomotives, perhaps with all sails set, over seven miles of land, until the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence are reached, when she again sails on her way to the open sea. Such a spectacle would be a grand sight. Surely it will attract a countless number of people to the wide awake people of Amherst, by the creation of home improvements have only to take advantage of their opportunities to make their town the most famous as well as the most prosperous in the province.
