**HE'S IN HARD LUCK**

Detective Mahoney Again Shot by a Tough.

The Wound, However, is not Dangerous—His Assault on an Escaped Burglar.

Welsh, son of Mrs. Welsh, who formerly kept a boarding house on Wellington avenue, Windsor, and who was serving time in Kingston for a burglary in Essex, and escaped from that institution about a year ago, was reported to be in hiding at Nick Stevens' on Arthur street, in Windsor.

The city and provincial police surrounded the place about three o'clock yesterday afternoon. Detective Mahoney went in to search the house.

Welsh was in the house and as Mahoney entered, rushed into a room, followed by the detective.

Welsh said, "I'll shoot." Mahoney said for him not to do it, as the house was surrounded.

Welsh fired, and the bullet grazed Mahoney's left leg below the knee, making a flesh wound.

Mahoney retired in good order, and the other police coming in, Welsh was overpowered. He showed fight, but was eventually handcuffed and put in the lock-up. Mahoney's wound is not dangerous.
