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

Current Comment

The result of the vote of the proposed to inaugurate the eight-hour day by the principle of majority voting in favor of it. The vote stood: For the eight-hour proposition, 19,443; against, 5,488; a majority for the proposition, 13,955. This means that where agreements are not against it, the eight hour day will be inaugurated all over the jurisdiction in January, 1906.

A PADDED MEMBERSHIP

The National Congress has only about 2,500 Members, while Claiming Ten Thousand.

We would recommend trade unionists to read carefully the report of the so-called National Trades and Labor Congress, which recently held its second annual convention in Ottawa.

It will be found commencing on page 361 of the Gazette for the month of October, which was published by the Government Department of Labor. All that is needed to thoroughly expose this huge con-

vention is to carefully study that report.

T. J. Griffiths, the secretary-treasurer, claims a total membership of 19,453 in 47 local unions. This membership, at a capitation tax of 12 cents a member per year, should net a total revenue from that source of \$1,257.20, but no reference is made to the original report of the auditors.

It is found that the capitation tax received only amounted (all told) to \$960.00, which would show a paying membership of less than 5,000. The re-

ports states that two out of the forty-seven local unions are in London, Ontario; and they are credited with 200 members.

Now, we know what we are talking about when we state that this is a deliberate fabrication. Secretary Griffiths says only too well that the two national unions formed in London to act as strike-breakers were stillborn, and that at the time of their birth, in fact, outside of a month they were reduced to non-existence, and that occurred over twelve months ago, and we doubt if they ever paid a cent of capitation tax.

The other figures in the report of the secretary-treasurer are equally reliable with those that refer to London, Ontario. We don't wonder that the capitation tax only totals \$960.00.

We don't presume to speak for other places. We prefer to let the auditor's report speak for itself; but we do know that the national movement does not exist in London, and that Secretary Griffiths knew of that fact when he prepared his official report.

Just got the October Labor Gazette and figure the problem out for yourself: don't take our word for it, but go by the official report of the National Congress itself. You will find it the richest thing you ever read, and we only wonder that Griffiths was so short-sighted as to let the official auditor's report get into print. Just read up the proceedings of the convention as given in the Government publication and you will not be long in arriving at the conclusion that the whole aggregation is a row of mighty small potatoes that has been struck by a freight.
