INCREASES WAGES OF HELPERS

C. P. R. Gives Advances to Men in **Mechanical Trades Between Fort** William and Laggan

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.-A decision regarding the schedule which will hereafter affect helpers to the mechanical trades of the C. P. R. was decided upon yesterday, as a result of the confer-el.ces which have been in progress since last Saturday between the men and the officials. The new change which has been decided upon will after the men between Fort William and Laggan, and south to Kootenay Land-

From Fort William to Broadview the rate of pay will now be 261/2 cents per hour for boiler helpers. Hitherto the rate of pay was 23 cents an hour, the increase per hour amounting to 312 cents. On the division extending from Broadview to Laggan, and also south to Kootenay Landing, there is 2 cents difference, and the rate of pay for similarily employed men will now be 28½ cents an hour. On the division reaching from Laggan to Vancouver n

decision has yet been reached.

While the boiler washers and helpers thus get an increase over the old rate of 3½ cents an hour, the machine men and other specialists in the trade are apportioned an increase amounting to 4 cents an hour in advance of the old

was given to all the other trades which have been in conference with the offi-cials, and it was to be expected that the same concession would be made to the helpers when their decision arrived. The daily wage of the men now on the first division will be \$2.381/2, while on the division west of Broadview to Laggan, the two-cent difference will make the daily wage of the latter amount to \$2.56½. Previous to the change, which was decided upon yesterday, the wages per day on the two divisions were \$2.07 and \$2.25.
