FATAL ACCIDENT—A few days ago a man named John McKinnon, of Strathbrooke, C. E., was handling a load of lime with a span of horses from Petit Rocher to the Vale farm, Bathurst. The horses became unmanageable and ran away. In getting off the wagon McKinnon caught his foot in one of the wheels and was dragged a considerable distance. When picked up he was found that he was dangerously injured. One leg was broken above the ankle and he received serious internal injuries from the fall which he died on Monday last week. The remains were taken charge of by the unfortunate man's brother, who was telegraphed for.

The 4th of July—The United States flag was displayed on the tower of the staff of the office of L. C. Call in the United States consular agent at Newcastle. We observe that some ultra-loyal military men in Ontario have occasionally become incensed because that flag has been flying to the breeze by U. S. citizens in their region at times, in honor of some national or other occasion. It is proof of the existence of a more rational and neighborly feeling here, that while Col. Call is in camp with his battery at Sussex, wearing the Queen's uniform, his flagstaff can be decorated as noted in honor of the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, while his fellow citizens have no feeling in the matter other than one of satisfaction that a friendly nation can be thus honored on its national holiday.

Dominion Day.—A large number of our people celebrated Dominion Day by making excursions down the river.

The holiday was observed here on Monday instead of Saturday, for most of the people and Chatham people enjoyed it in various ways, the leading feature of the celebration being a successful bonnet hop in the curling rink in the evening, under the auspices of the Public Square committee, which was presided over by McEcheran's efficient committee. General manager Wynn and his assistants deserve credit for their enterprise and the excellent and friendly character of the pleasant gathering.

Newcastle's celebration of Dominion Day consisted of trotting and bicycle races on the driving park. Mr. John Robinson's Dick Little won the green race, with Mr.

Frank Jardine's Mand, second. In the three minute race the Campbellton flyer, Meridian, owned by Mr. Stewart, won easily. Mr. Chas. Atkinson's Jennie L. being second and Mr. Gremley's Prince, third.

The time in the green race was 3:15, 3:18 and 3:02, and 2:53.

McEcheran, Mr. McEcheran, John O'Brien and John Sargent were judges and Mr. John McKean time keeper.

The mile bicycle race was contested by Joseph Patric of Millerton, A. Bell, of Newcastle and S. McLaughlin of Campbellton. Patric had the best of it from the physical effort necessary to the delivery of three sermons on so hot a day, to say nothing of the fact that each discourse seemed to be better than its admirable predecessor.

The collections during the day were all good, and they materially aided the fund for clearing off the debt upon the new building. This church edifice was erected in place of that destroyed by fire, and it occupies the most prominent site in the village, at the forks of the great roads leading respectively to the bridge over the S. W. Miramichi and along the route to the station, and a little more than a quarter of a mile from the railway station. It is 30x50 feet and the ceiling is 20 feet high.

The exterior appearance is quite imposing, a lower part of the front being a massive spire 80 feet high. The interior is in keeping with the outside and much better finished than many churches in larger places. There is no woodwork in the interior, the western end and a composite stained glass window in the east end. The side windows are gothic lancets, with colored glass tops. The floors are of juniper and the wainscoting and trimmings consist of a simple hemlock, filled and varnished, showing a beautiful graining quite equal to ash or oak. The pulpit platform is flanked with a massive rail and turned balusters and the choir is terminated at the rear of it by a railing which is lighted by the composite colored window referred to, and flanked by iron castles. The apex of choir rail and balusters correspond with those of the pulpit-platform and rise sufficiently far above the choir to be seen with excellent effect. The front of the platform is finished in bird's-eye maple, and the whole, in design and coloring, is quite artistic.

The new church is a credit to the community, and particularly so to those by whose liberality and personal efforts it has been erected, and it is right to say that foremost among the latter is Wm. Sartin, Esq., ex-M. P., who at the service of last Sunday, was prominent in making all who attended feel welcome and as comfortable as the excessive heat would admit of.

STEWART'S HILL. A much needed work is to be done at the place known as Stewart's Hill, on the highway between Daoktown and Boies town. When the railway was built the highway was appropriated for it and so-called new highway made over the steep hill to the south. This new piece of road is probably the worst in the province, being impassable for loaded teams. The Commissioner Emerson, Surveyor General Tweedie and supervisor John L. Murray examined it on Monday last and it was decided that a road by an easier grade should be made, beginning by raising the present bridge some six feet and following a course on the face of the hill between the railway and the present road until the steep grade is overcome. The cost of the work will be upwards of \$1,000 and it will be undertaken as soon as the necessary plans and other particulars can be arranged.

ROGUELAWTOWN BRIDGE was visited by the Chief Commissioner on Tuesday, who was accompanied by the Surveyor General and the Inspector, Mr. Wm. Lawlor. He was much pleased with the character of the work and the progress made by the contractor, Mr. Lawrence Doyle.

A RENEWAL OF LEASE WANTED. Coun. Flanagan presented the petition of John McLaughlin, asking for a refund of taxes which he had been forced to pay. He had removed from Newcastle to Melrose, Mass., July 1st, 1892, notifying the assessors of the fact, and yet he had been assessed on \$18,800 personal property and \$800 income taxes, which, as a non-resident, he was not liable for.

The petition was returned to the committee on petitions. Carried.

COUN. BETHS reported from the County Accounts Committee on a number of accounts, which were passed as recommended.

INSPECTOR MEXIELE WITHDROVE THE SCOTTS' ACT ACCOUNT.

Coun. Flanagan, as one of the Committee County accounts, was surprised that there was no bill from Inspector Mexieles for the year 1892. Many whom he knew were getting bills from him. He would like Mr. Mexieles to call on the Council, as he had heretofore been done.

INSPECTOR MEXIELE, without asking to be heard here spoke from the lobby and said he had no accounts to the July session. He thought it wiser not to submit any. He had been informed that the law required him to hand in accounts only once a year, at the July session.

Coun. Flanagan said it was a loss of doing business to run a whole year without any account. There had been quite a number of accounts sent in during the year, and he would like to see a statement of expenses incurred to date. He should be content for not doing so.

Coun. Tozer—Has the Council any authority to call on the Inspector for half yearly returns?

Sec. Treas.—It is inquired to make returns in December. Mr. Mexieles can make returns in July if he chooses to do so.

Coun. Ryan—If there is no law to compel him to do so, it is of no use to talk on the matter.

THE FIEBER, McLAGGAN AND SULLIVAN PETITION.

Coun. Doyle reported from the committee on petitions, against granting the prayer of Hattie Pierce for a reduction of taxes, the Chatham assessors having stated that there was no over-assessment. Report adopted.

Coun. Doyle also reported against the petition of John McLaggan. Report adopted.

Coun. Doyle reported on the petition of Corvelia Sullivan that the assessors not having reported, the committee recommend that it be allowed till January, 1894.

THE BIENNIAL ELECTION MATTER.
