FREDERICTON, N. B., May 31.—The funeral of Private Morah, who died on Friday night from the result of an accidental discharge of a loaded rifle, was held this morning with full military honors. Canon Roberts conducted the services at the military hospital, after which the body was conveyed on a gun carriage to the rural cemetery for interment, accompanied by the Rev. J. H. Steyer, a firing party of twelve men and two non-commissioned officers. Deceased was a native of Halifax and had been connected with the station here for seven years.

SITE FOR FOG SIREN SELECTED.

Half-way Between Pontic Lepreaux and Partridge Island.

Work Begins at Once—Lightship for Entrance of Bay to Be Launched August 20th.

Colonel Anderson, chief engineer of the marine and fisheries department, Ottawa, in company with a number of St. John gentlemen, hurriedly gathered together by the board of trade committee, went down on the government str. Landowen yesterday to inspect a site for a new siren of Negro Point in the Bay of Fundy. A site was selected about half way between Pontic Lepreaux and Partridge Island, and the work will go on at once, some of the machinery having been already procured. Siren in this locality is much needed, as the coast along there is very dangerous and during the last few years has been the scene of a number of shipwrecks.

The business places burned in addition were: Darrow's foundry, Parson's hardware shop, of J. M. Clark, J. E. Weston, R. P. Newell, Thomas Fero, residences of Mayor Sinclair, R. H. Burgess, C. R. Denton, Fowle, Mrs. Wm. Armstrong, Dr. St. Clair, J. E. House, S. H. Betts, J. L. McMichael and A. Robertson. No estimate of the total loss or insurance is yet made.

FOURTY INJURED.

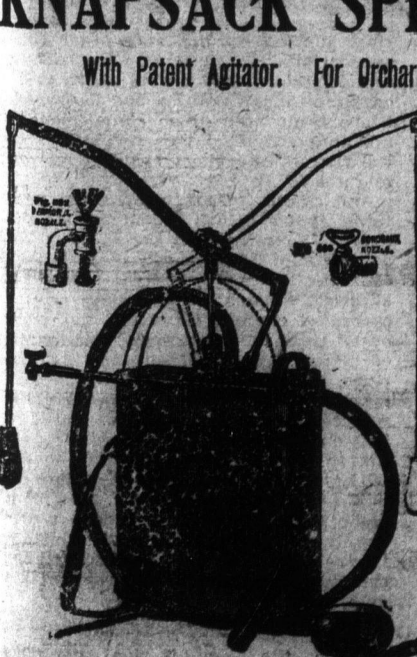
