Fredericton, N. B., July 21. — In an effort to obtain complete and accurate data as to the number of unemployed in New Brunswick, the Department of Public Works, through the Minister, Hon. D. A. Stewart, has inaugurated a thorough survey of this province. The Department is seeking the co-operation of all municipalities within New Brunswick and a questionnair ehas gone out to all county councillors and aldermen for circulation in their respective parishes and wards.

The Department of Public Works has issued a special appeal to the county and civic authorities to accelerate the work of gathering this data with respect to the unemployment conditions and the councillors and aldermen are being urged to have the questionnaire distributed without delay.
