



PREECHES SLOGAN IN CANADA TOUR

Making his third trans-Canada motor trip, N. T. Bowman of Toronto, passed through Edmundston Friday.

The total mileage which he estimates will be covered is 10,729. The entire trip will be within the borders of Canada.

The second jaunt is from Halifax to Vancouver and will cover approximately 3,209 miles.

NEW BRUNSWICK SEED POTATOES TO NEWFOUNDLAND

6,000 Sacks Sent Forward at Request of Government of Ancient Colony.

Six thousand sacks of New Brunswick seed potatoes have been shipped to Newfoundland for planting.

The price received for the Newfoundland order was satisfactory to the growers and an advance over the price which prevailed in the Canadian city market centers this season.

The Association here also shipped what is believed to be the only carload of Ex. No. 1 Government Certified Green Mountain potatoes to the Dominion Experiment Station at Fredericton.

Announcement was made here today that the annual Field Day of the New Brunswick Seed Potato Growers' Association would be held next month at the Dominion Experiment Station at Fredericton.

TRY THIS IN YOUR KITCHEN

TOMATO ICE Season tomato juice cocktail to taste. Pour into freezing tray and freeze. Stir every half hour. When ready to serve beat with a fork and place in cocktail glasses with a sprig of mint or parsley.

ROQUEFORT MOUSSE 5 ounces Roquefort cheese 1/2 pint whipping cream 1/2 cup milk Grate cheese and put with milk in top of double boiler. Stir until melted, then cool. Whip cream, fold into cheese mixture and freeze in refrigerator. When frozen slice in thin slices and serve on lettuce leaves. Very nice served with crisp crackers as a last course.

RHUBARB ICE Wash three cups rhubarb (cut into one-inch pieces) and add fluid of one lemon, one cup sugar and half cup water and cook until rhubarb loses its shape. Force through strainer. There should be 1 1/2 cups of the juice. Cool. Combine two cups water one cup sugar and juice of half a lemon and boil for five minutes. Cool and add to first mixture. Freeze. Stir well every half hour.




