ROUMANIA LIKELY TO BE FORCED TO FIGHT NOW

Austro-German Ultimatum in Preparation and Large Bodies of Teutonic Troops Being Massed Along the Frontier.

London, July 19.-An Austro-German ultimatum to Roumania, Is being prepared, according to the Moscow Russkoye Slovoe, which is quoted in despatches received here. It is added that large bodies of Teutonic troops are massing on the Roumanian frontier to give emphasis to the ultimatum, which it is declared, will demand unimpeded transit for munitions of war.
