Alumni Reunions at Los Angeles.

The metropolitan and heterogeneous character of the population of the Pacific coast was in no way more strikingly indicated than in the unusual number of alumni reunions held in connection with the Northern Baptist Convention at Los Angeles. There were ten reunions, and it was simply impossible for one to attend them all. They were all occasions of deep personal interest, giving opportunity for the meeting of friends and school mates who had been separated for many years. In one instance, at least, college mates who had not met since graduation forty-seven years ago met at one of these reunions. This and instances such as this show how unusual warm and tender was the feeling of fellowship at these reunions. The institutions the alumni of which held reunions are: The Training School in Chicago, Denison University, Newton Theological Institution, Colgate University and Hamilton Theological Seminary, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, the University of Chicago, the University of Rochester and Rochester Theological Seminary, the Pacific Coast Baptist Theological Seminary, Kalamazoo College, and Shurtleff College. The fact that there were a sufficient number of graduates of all these ten institutions present at the Convention at Los Angeles is a testimony in itself to the value of the reunion as a means of maintaining the fraternal character of the people of the Pacific Slope.

Baptists are well represented in the commission form of government of the Denver, Colorado Mayor J. M. Perkins, Commissioner of Safety Oscar Hayes, and the Mayor's secretary, F. D. Stackhouse, are Baptists.

The enrollment at the Northern Baptist Convention, Los Angeles, was 1,927, divided as follows: 389 ministers, 244 men, 550 women, 39 representatives of societies, and 677 visitors.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATION.

The land here is a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the limits of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the winter.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may present a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent. An exemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

Reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.


