Alumni Reunions at Los Angeles.

The metropolitan and heterogeneous character of the population of the Pacific coast was in no way more strikingly indicated than in the unusual number of alumni reunions held in connection with the Northern Baptist Convention at Los Angeles. There were ten reunions, and it was simply impossible for one to attend them all. They were all occasions of deep personal interest, giving opportunity for the meeting of friends and school mates who had been separated for many years. In one instance, at least, college mates who had not met since graduation forty-seven years ago met at one of these reunions. This and instances such as this show how unusually warm and tender was the feeling of fellowship at these reunions. The institutions the alumni of which held reunions are: The Training School in Chicago, Denison University, Newton Theological Institution, Colgate University and Hamilton Theological Seminary, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, the University of Chicago, the University of Rochester and Rochester Theological Seminary, the Pacific Coast Baptist Theological Seminary, Kalamazoo College, and Shurtleff College. The fact that there were a sufficient number of graduates of all these ten institutions present at the Convention at Los Angeles to meet in reunion was significant of the cosmopolitan character of the people of the Pacific Slope.

Baptists are well represented in the commission form of government. In Denver, Colorado, Mayor J. M. Perkins, Commissioner of Safety Oscar Hayes, and the Mayor's secretary, F. D. Stackhouse, are Baptists.

The enrollment at the Northern Baptist Convention, Los Angeles, was 1,927, divided among: 389 ministers, 244 men, 580 women, 39 representatives of societies, and 677 visitors.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

The sole and full right of any mine over 18 years old, may be homesteaded for a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. An applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after the date of application for the land and in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the country.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may present a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

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A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house thereon.

Reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
