**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**
Any person who is the sole head of a
family or any male over 18 years old, may
homestead a quarter section of available
land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan
or Alberta. The applicant must be a
resident of the Dominion Lands
Agency of his province, or make an ap-
plication to any agency on certificate by father,
mother, son, daughter, brother or sister,
or intending homesteader.
On the date of residence upon and
cultivation of the land in each of three
years the homesteader may live within
six miles of his homestead on a farm of
at least 40 acres wholly owned and ac-
quired by him or his father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in-
cluding his family may occupy a quarter
section of six years from date of homestead en-
try including the time required to erect a
homesteaded building and cultivate fifty
acres per year.
A homesteader who has exhausted his
entitlement may again obtain a quarter
section may enter for a purchased home-
stead on any vacant land at \$100 per
acre. Duties—Must reside six months in
the section and erect a house worth \$200 or
more.
