

FOUR LOST WHEN THE M. D. GRESSY SINKS

Two Thousand-Ton Vessel
Well Known Along Atlan-
tic Coast Founders 200
Miles Southeast of Sandy
Hook.

New York, April 13.—The American
steamer M. D. Gressy, which left here
April 7 for Havre with general cargo,
was sunk during a gale last Monday
when about 200 miles southeast of
Sandy Hook. Second Officer G. Smith
and two seamen were drowned in
launching a life boat, and later the
ship's cook died from exposure.
Word of the sea tragedy was
brought here by Capt. Nelson, who
with his wife and nine survivors of
the ship, were rescued by a British
steamship after they had drifted in an
open boat for 75 hours. Capt. Nelson

said the Gressy, heavily laden, sprang
a leak in the stern and went rapidly
to pieces. Two boats were launched,
but one, containing the second mate
and two of the crew was crushed and
the men lost.
In the other boat Capt. Nelson took
his wife and the other ten members
of his crew. The ship's cook died
shortly before they were rescued.
The M. D. Gressy, 2,114 tons gross,
1,884 tons net register, was built in
1896 at Bath. She was owned by the
American Union Line.

SOCIALIST IN CHARGE
IN RUSSIAN CABINET.

Petrograd, via London, April 13.—
M. Karsenky, minister of justice and
a Socialist, has been presiding at the
meetings of the Russian cabinet dur-
ing the absence of Premier Lvov, who
is visiting the battle front.
The naval station at Kronstadt has
been removed from the jurisdiction of
naval authorities and included in the
Petrograd military district.

U. S. WARSSIPS PATROLLING SEABOARD

Will Relieve British and
French Warships Off Cana-
dian and New England
Coasts.

Washington, April 13.—With high
brand French naval officers in con-
ference with American officers definite
steps have been taken toward partici-
pation of the American navy in the
war against Germany. Patrol of the
entire Atlantic seaboard, reaching
southward to the Panama Canal zone
and possibly northward to include
Canada, will be the first duty of Am-
erican warships. With that goes the
necessity of guarding against the
probable extension of the German
submarine campaign to include ap-
proaches to major American ports.

Will Be Relieved.

British and French ships now on
this patrol duty will be withdrawn as
soon as the American forces have
their lines established. The American
squadrons will operate from British
and French bases in the South Atlan-
tic where necessary.

This was learned today in connec-
tion with the announcement that Vice-
Admiral M. E. Browning of the Brit-
ish navy, and Rear Admiral R. A.
Garnett of the French navy, are in
Washington conferring with Secretary
Daniels and other officers of the Am-
erican navy.

GALVESTON HEARS OF GO. MERCE RAIDER IN GULF OF MEXICO

Galveston, Tex., April 13.—Informa-
tion that a German commerce raider
in the guise of a sailing ship, has en-
tered the Gulf of Mexico was reported
today in Galveston. This news was
received from an unnamed British
steamer in a radio message to a ship
anchored here. The vessel is said to
be equipped with auxiliary power. It
also has been reported that a German
submarine is operating in the eastern
gulf.

CANON RENAUD DEAD

Montreal, April 13.—Rev. Canon J.
Frederick Renaud, pastor of St. Thomas'
(Anglican) church, died here this
morning, in his 69th year. A son, Mis-
sior A. L. H. Renaud, was killed at
Courcellette.
