St. John Boy is Training With Aviation Corps—Been Absent from St. John for Five

MAJOR WETMORE **APPOINTED TO NO. 7** MILITARY DISTRICT

Is Deputy Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General -U. S. Wants Returned Men for Training Officers.

Major S. S. Wetmore, of Clifton, N. B., has been appointed deputy assistant adjutant and quartermaster gendral for Military District No. 7. He entered upon his duties yesterday. Major Wetmore is a returned man, having left Canada with the 55th Battalion. While in England he was attached for some time to the adjutant-general's office in London, and also acted as conducting officer. Major Wetmore is considered one of the best administrative officers in the Canadian army, and his many friends will learn of his promotion, which has been accorded to him by sheer ability and competence.

It was also learned through official channels yesterday that the United States authorities have communicated with this district regarding the possibility of obtaining returned men for returning officers in America. Owing to the demand made upon the returned officers by the Imperial and Canadian governments it is doubtful if any can be spared from Canada. It is understood that it is almost inpossible to obtain a sufficient number of returned officers for duty in Canada, who are competent to instruct.
