



The above pictures show a couple of the scenes wherein Omaha citizens lost their grasp on law and order and resorted to the primitive law of death to the malefactor. In the Omaha case the victim of the mob proved to be a negro, and with him an accidental victim, a white man of twenty-three years. The Court House, valued at more than a million dollars, is a mass of ruins, due to the recklessness of the growd. Mayor Edward P. Smith, thought by some to be a negro sympathizer, was a victim of the mob, and was for a time in danger of his life at the hands of the rabble, who wanted to lynch him. Major General Leonard Wood is at the head of rederal troops now stationed in Omaha to spell any disturbance or race rist should one develop.
