MARKET REPORTS

STOCKS, BONDS AND PRODUCE

STOCK SELLING RESUMED ON SAT'S MARKET

The Movement Was Prompted by the News That the Administration Would Press Injunction Against Striking Miners.

New York, Nov. 8.—Selling of stocks was resumed during today's brief but lively session, the movement being prompted by the news that the federal administration would press its injunction proceedings against the striking coal miners.

The same shares which suffered greatest depreciation in the week's reaction were singled out again for pressure. Steels, Equipments, Motors and Oils recorded extreme declines of 2 to 7 points.

In a number of cases lower quotations of the more speculative issues, recent advances of 5 to 20 points were altogether effaced. Rails and Shipings were carried down by the reversal, but the former showed greater recuperative power than any other part of the active list. Pools made tentative efforts to elevate some of the motor specialties at the outset, when the market was less susceptible to pressure, but the operations were abandoned later, weakness prevailing at the close. Sales amounted to 775,000 shares. Conditions in the bond market were mixed. Liberty issues easing again with most domestic issues. An irregular trend was shown by leading foreign issues.

Total sales, par value, aggregated \$8,500,000. Old United States bonds were unaltered on call, during the week. The effect of the Federal Reserve Banks' action against speculation was seen in the bank statement actual loans decreasing by \$38,668,000 and reserves increasing almost \$50,000,000, total excess reserves thereby expanding to approximately \$200,000,000.

WILSON SATISFIED WITH PROGRESS OF TREATY FIGHT

Should Committee Resolution Prevail No One Offers Any View as to President's Course Then.

Washington, Nov. 7.—President Wilson, today, told Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, Administration leader in the Senate Treaty fight, that he would be entirely satisfied with any reservations supporters of the Treaty might feel justified in accepting, provided they did not nullify the League of Nations covenant and were designed for the purpose of interpreting the terms of the Treaty.

The President, Senator Hitchcock said, expressed his very strong approval of what had been done to date and agreed that no compromise would be offered unless a deadlock was reached on a resolution of ratification. Senator Hitchcock outlined his program as, first, an endeavor to defeat the reservations reported by the foreign relations committee, and if that failed, to vote down the resolution of ratification contained in their report. He then moved to present a resolution of ratification and, should a deadlock ensue, to attempt a compromise with Republican opponents.

Senator Hitchcock said if a resolution of ratification containing the committee reservations were adopted, the world would be concerned, but that the President could "pigeon hole" the treaty. He declined to speculate as to the probable course of the President should the Committee resolution prevail.

SEN. PROUDFOOT INTRODUCED TO THE SENATE

There is Another Senate Vacancy for Ontario Likely to be Filled by the Appointment of Col. Smythe.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 7.—Senator William Proudfoot who was named to the Upper House yesterday was this afternoon introduced in the Senate by Sir James Loughheed and Senator Blain. Senator Proudfoot succeeded Hon. N. W. Rowell, as Liberal leader in the Ontario Legislature when Mr. Rowell entered the Union cabinet and held the post until the selection of Mr. Hartley Dewart as leader at the Provincial Liberal convention. Senator Proudfoot ran as an independent candidate for the Ontario legislature in the recent provincial elections.

There is another Senate vacancy for Ontario which is likely to be filled by the appointment of Colonel Smythe, a former member of parliament for East Algoma.


