### FARMERS OF QUEBEC WOULD HAVE TARIFF MADE SLIGHTLY LOWER

Suggest to Commission Drop of About Nine Per Cent. in Rates.

Quebec, Nov. 11—Urging a general reduction in the tariff on all articles required for the cultivation of the soil and for the support of the family, farmers of the Province of Quebec and their representatives were given a hearing by the Tariff Commission here this atternoon.

The entire afternoon sitting was devoted to hearing the representatives of the farming classes, and at five o'clock the commission was adjourned. Hon. Namise Garneau, M.C.L., President of the Breeders' Association of the Province of Quebec, spoke for the farmers.

The average existing tariff of 21 per cent. on articles essential to agriculture is too great for the country industries, Mr. Garneau declared. He urged an average tariff of 12 per cent.
