Spirit of Service Red Cross Film

**Picture to Influence Audi-
ences to Join Red Cross in
Peace Work.**

"The Spirit of Service" is the title of a one-reel motion picture, produced by the American Red Cross for the purpose of furthering interest in the coming roll call for the renewal of membership.

The picture is a mingling of allegory and realism and carries a strong appeal. The exteriors for the allegory are of classic beauty and the entire pro-

duction has been made with a fine sense of artistic values. The scenario was written by Hamish McLawrie and the fine effects in photography were achieved by E. Burton Steens. Tefft Johnson directed, assisted by Arline Frederic as "Service" and Logan Paul as "Wisdom." The generosity of these artists and others who contributed their services has enabled the Red Cross to produce this picture at a nominal expense.

The story begins with the symbolical figures of War, Pestilence and Famine, which have been born into the world as a result of war. From this state of the world's chaos appears the "Spirit of Service," who is eager to re-

live the distress, but is at a loss to know what agency for good is most in need of her efforts. She calls to her aid her hand-maidens, Faith, Hope and Love, who advise her to seek counsel of Wisdom. Looking through Wisdom's telescope, all parts of the world are brought within her vision. She sees the work of relief accomplished by the American Red Cross and in that organization finds her opportunity for service.

The picture should have a strong in-

fluence in adding to the membership of the American Red Cross.
