A SOCIETY TO CURB PROFANITY

Men of St. Mary's Church Organizing a Holy Name Society

The preliminary steps for the formation of a Holy Name Society in Berlin were taken at St. Mary's R. C. church on Sunday afternoon, when over 200 male members of the congregation turned out to a meeting held for that purpose.

Rev. Theo. Spetz outlined the objects of the Holy Name Society and gave a brief sketch of its origin. The chief aim of the Society is to curb profanity, to refrain from, and discourage the irreverent utterances of the name of Christ and His Saints among others, and to maintain and increase faith in the divinity of the Saviour. The pastor cited an instance where a man travelling on a train succeeded in having a fellow passenger desist in the use of profane language by constant rebukes and admonition. In the exercise of such a duty prudence and common sense were essential, and if arguments failed then he advised recourse to an officer of the law to stop blasphemous language.

The Holy Name Society has as its origin the preaching of the Dominicans in the thirteenth century. These good priests preached incessantly against profanity, and the formation of the Holy Name Society was the result. The Society, Rev. Father Spetz explained, comes under the direct jurisdiction of the Pope. The Society has a large membership in the United States and also in Toronto and Hamilton, and it is hoped to secure a strong organization locally.

Mr. W. J. Motz acted as secretary of the meeting and Rev. Father Spetz assisted in taking the names of those present. A committee composed of Messrs. H. J. Zieger, A. Engert, J. Colombo, J. Haller, and August Laug was appointed to look over the constitution of the society in other places, and to draft one for the local society. When this is ready another meeting will be held for the purpose of electing officers.

ST. PETER'S CHOR AT NEW HAMBURG SERVICE

The third anniversary of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, New Hamburg, was celebrated yesterday afternoon, when about one hundred members of St. Peter's Lutheran church, Berlin, including the choir, journeyed to New Hamburg to assist in the services. Fr. E. E. Oberlander delivered the address of the afternoon, preaching from the text, St. John 3:30, "He must increase, but I must decrease." The sermon was on the power of witnessing for Christ.

The choir of St. Peter's Church Berlin travelled over in automobiles, and rendered some very excellent music for the occasion, under the leadership of Prof. George Ziegler. All the music was unaccompanied, and it was very greatly appreciated by those who heard it.

The return trip was made late in the afternoon all arriving in time for the evening service.

REV. H. W. CREWS SAYS FAREWELL

Pastor Severs Ties With Congregation of Trinity Methodist Church

Rev. H. W. Crews, after three years' pastorate of Trinity Methodist church last night preached his farewell sermon to his congregation. There was the usual good Sabbath night congregation. The text was part of Paul's valedictory, when he said that he was about to depart from his letter to the Philippians, chapter 1, and verses 12 and 13.

"Wherefore my beloved, as ye have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of His good pleasure."

The speaker at the outset deplored the teaching that would have people believe that salvation was something that could irrevocably be secured. The gift of God, eternal life and the gift could be repudiated at any time. To be saved meant more than to be a moralist. A moral life was good so far as it went, but like a ladder that failed of ten feet of the window where human life was dependent on it for safety, it did not go far enough.

The result of accepting Salvation, and failing to use the power he had placed in human hands, would be that many people, the speaker stated, would be moral dwarfs throughout eternity. Further he emphatically remonstrated, the doctrine of total depravity was three-fourths laziness.

Mr. Crews emphasized the need of working out salvation with fear and trembling. He drew a picture of the soul's relationship to God, and the delight of the companionship between God and His people.

Words of Farewell.

A Methodist minister, and a Methodist minister's son, the speaker said that his life seemed to be full of farewells. He regretted that the ties which bound pastor and people were so soon to be severed, and he tried to make it clear that no one could escape this obligation.

"Believing that we are closely related socially, I have sought to awaken the social conscience, and to teach that I am my brother's keeper. I have taught the Bible as an infallible guide to Salvation, along religious and moral lines. I have shown open hostility of everyday life, and although naturally I find it hard to speak along these lines, I have not been cowardly, but have struck the hardest blows I know how to strike in an advocate of national peace."

Closing, he thanked the church members, and all those who aided him during his pastorate, and had helped to make his three years, pleasant ones.

Appreciated Pastor.

Mr. E. P. Clement on behalf of the congregation, spoke warm words of appreciation of Mr. Crews' service as a pastor. "We have had many strong men since this church came into being," he said, "but I am sure I voice the opinion of the whole congregation when I say that we have never had three better years. Speaking in favor of the itinerant system, the speaker said that it would be a pity for a congregation to monopolize a splendid man like Mr. Crews. "A Christian should be the most perfect gentleman in the world," Mr. Clement said. "I feel I have never heard from Mr. Crews, in the pulpit or elsewhere, a single word he would not like to hear. The Board members have been most harmonious and deeply regret losing Mr. Crews."

It was late before the services ended, but many remained to bid Mr. Crews farewell, and many expressions of deep regret at the severance of pastor and people were heard. Mr. Crews will leave for Toronto on Tuesday, July 1st.

JUMPED OFF STREET CAR

Armenian in Hospital With Concussion of the Brain. Accident Excited Women

Last evening about 8:45 o'clock an Armenian by the name of Simon Seamore, jumped off a moving street car in front of Mr. A. St. Hallman's residence at King street, east, fell, and slid upon the pavement. A surgeon was quickly on the scene who had the unconscious and bleeding man removed from the road to the sidewalk for examination. A large crowd quickly gathered and two Assyrian women, bareheaded, with their hair flying wildly in all directions and shrieking in a language understood, prostrated themselves upon the man. Their shrieks sounded like wailings of hysterical derangement. It was only after other Assyrians discovered that it was the relative of theirs, but an Armenian that they were quickly pacified. It was a wild scene for a while.

The unfortunate man was removed to the hospital in the ambulance where it was found that he was badly bruised and was suffering from concussion of the brain. He is progressing well and is expected to be around again in a few days.

NEW PASTOR IS INSTALLED

Rev. H. J. Behrens Assumes Charge of Church—Impressive Sermon By Rev. Mr. Bieber

Sunday was an eventful day in the history of the First English Evangelical Lutheran church of the Twin City, when the Rev. H. J. Behrens was finally installed as pastor of the church, by Rev. M. J. Bieber, the organizer of the church. A large congregation was present and took part in the service which was most impressive and inspiring.

The able and stirring address was delivered by Rev. M. J. Bieber who had a divine message for both new pastor and congregation. His text was I Timothy 6:20: "O Timothy keep that which is committed to thy trust." He advised the new pastor to have courage and to use simplicity in his words, to be a student, to pray, and to be a missionary. The members of the congregation were reminded of the fact that it was their duty to co-operate with the pastor, to be lenient in their judgments and to be obedient. Among other things Mr. Bieber said: "One year ago last April the organization of this congregation took place, since which time there has been a steady growth. At a meeting of the members of the congregation sometime ago it was decided to extend a call to you, which you after some consideration decided to accept. The important question now is: 'Are you prepared to undertake the duties of this high office?'"

"Keep in mind the fact that God has called you to be his minister. You have been his servant ever since the day of your birth. You have attended the university and the seminary after which you were ordained to the ministry. During the past five years you have acted as a missionary and your work has been so successful that this congregation decided to call you to the pastorate of the church."

"Now for the performance of your duties there are several requisites. First of all you must have courage. Do not hesitate to point out the wrongs and sins, whether general or particular. When at first thought you think that you would offend either rich or poor in your sermon, be not afraid God is with you and you are to deliver his message."

Second: In addressing your congregation you must use simplicity, so that the people will understand. Speak as Christ did. His language was most simple. Everybody could understand him.

Third: You must also be a student. Have good reading material, including books and magazines. You must keep abreast of the times, learn the arguments of the higher critics and those thinkers whose theories are contrary to the teaching of the Bible. You must be prepared to reply to such people. Remember also to read your Bible every day and receive God's message to you. Also do not forget to pray.

"Lastly you must be a missionary to win souls to Jesus Christ. Keep in mind the fact that when the day of reckoning comes you will be called upon to give an account of each soul under your charge. You must aim to bring more members into the church. But your work as a missionary is not only local but worldwide. There are millions of heathen who have not received word of Jesus Christ. The gospel must be preached to these. For this purpose money is required. Therefore do not hesitate to ask for money. We are living in the twentieth century. Contributions are not such as they were in the days of five and ten cent giving is past."

"But there is another aspect in this question. The members of the church will also have duties to perform. The members should co-operate with the pastor and speak well of him. Do not utter harsh words about your pastor, especially in the presence of your children. Be lenient therefore in your judgments."

After the close of the regular service the pastor was formally installed to the rites of the church. During the services the selections, " nearer My God to Thee," and "Abide With Me" were excellently rendered by the choir.

Berlin Man Killed by Fall in Toronto

ARMY BILL PASSES

(Canadian Press.)

Berlin, Germany, June 30.—The Imperial parliament adjourned until November 20th to-day after adopting all measures necessary for financing army increases, including six new cavalry regiments which had previously been agreed to. Consent of parliament was obtained by Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg promising to support in federal council a bill unanimously passed by house reducing the penalties inflicted by court martial when mitigating circumstances exist. The Socialists, Poles and Alsations voted against army increase bill which adds 136 thousand of all ranks and makes peace footing eight hundred and seventy thousand men.
