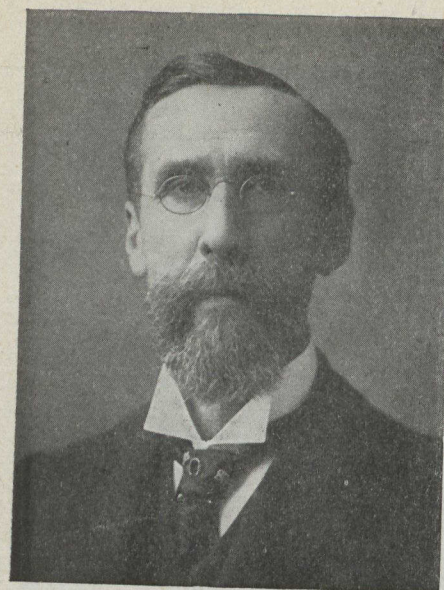
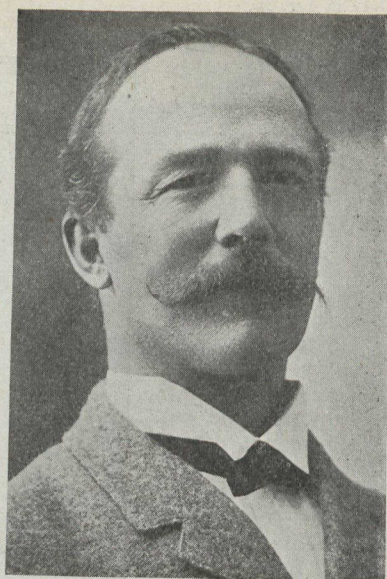


SOME OF THE VICTORS

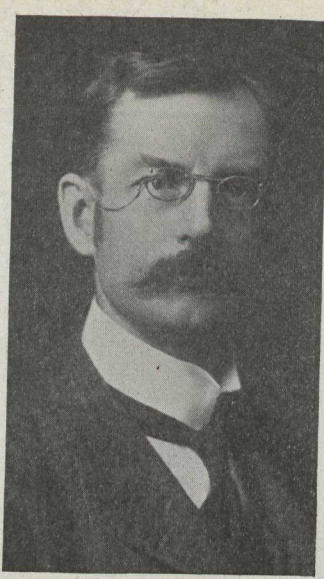
at the General Election

HON. GEORGE E. FOSTER (Con.),
Elected for the third time to represent North Toronto by a majority of over three thousand. He was Finance Minister in the Conservative administration from 1888 to 1896.



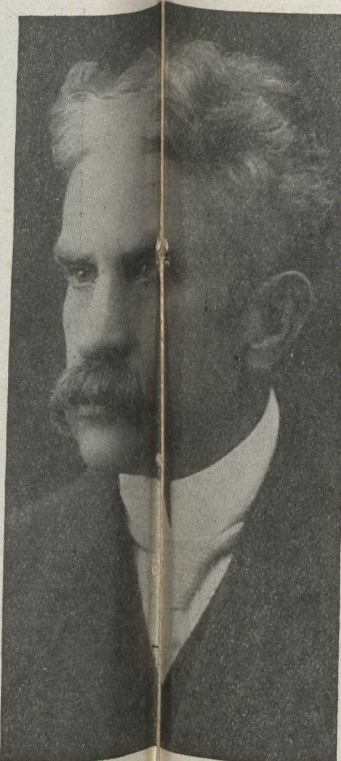
MR. EWDARD N. LEWIS (Con.),
Elected for the third time in West Huron. He is known as one of the most prolific producers of small legislation in the House. A Barrister.



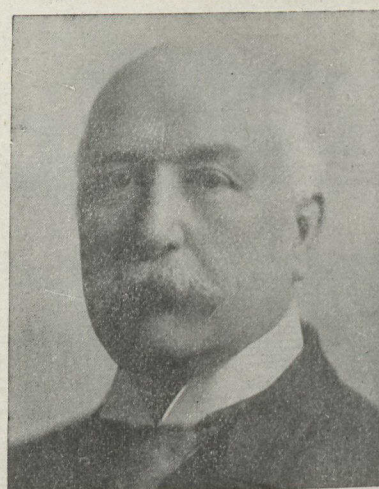
MR. HERBERT BROWN AMES (Con.),
Who has been re-elected for the third time in St. Antoine Division, Montreal. He made his mark in municipal affairs in that city. Director Ames-Holden Company.



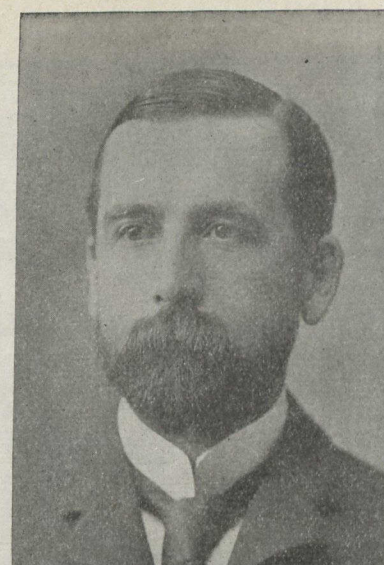
MR. HUGH GUTHRIE (Lib.),
One of the thirteen Liberals who saved their seats in Ontario. Elected fourth time in South Wellington. A Barrister at Guelph.



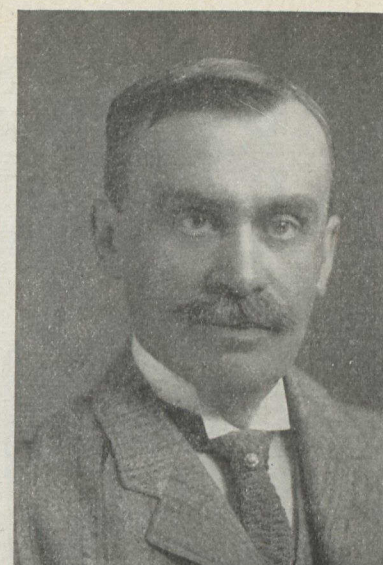
MR. E. L. BORDEN (Con.),
The leader of the victorious Conservative forces. He will now be called upon to form a Government. He was re-elected in Halifax which he represented 1896 to 1904 and 1908-1911. Elected leader February 6th, 1901. Since then he has resided in Ottawa.



MR. THOMAS W. CROTHERS (Con.),
Elected for the second time for North Essex. He is one of the leading members of the Ontario delegation. He was chairman of the Ontario School Book Commission. A barrister.



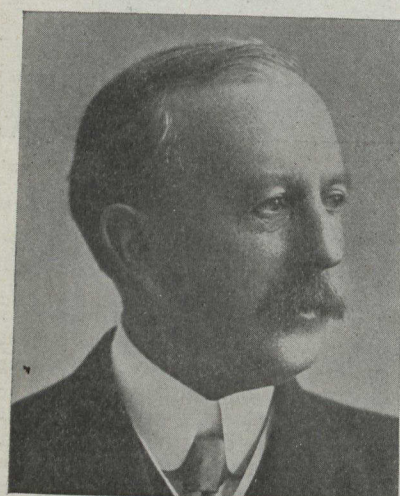
MR. GEO. HALSEY PERLEY (Con.),
Chief Conservative whip, who was chosen for Argenteuil. This will be his third term. A large operator in lumber.



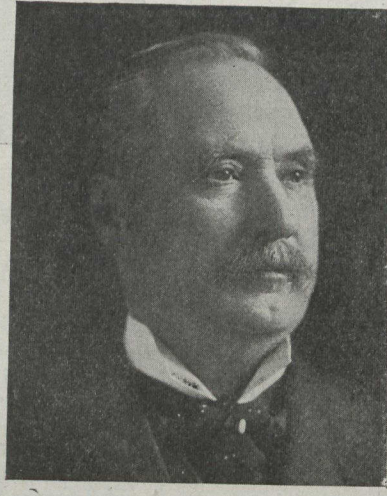
LT.-COL. RODOLPHE FORGET (Con.),
Who was elected for both Charlevoix and Montmorency, by good majorities. He has been a member of the House since 1904. Broker and financier.



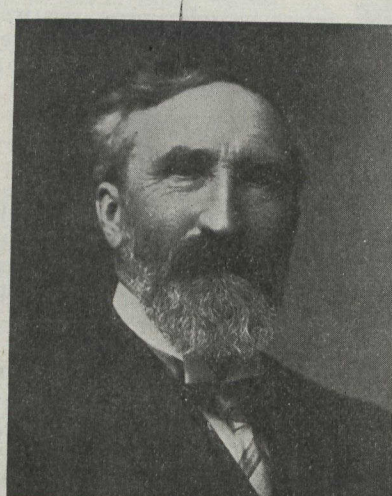
MR. JOHN STANFIELD (Con.),
Who was re-elected for Colchester, N. S., by an increased majority. This is his third consecutive victory. President Stanfield's Limited, Truro, N. S.



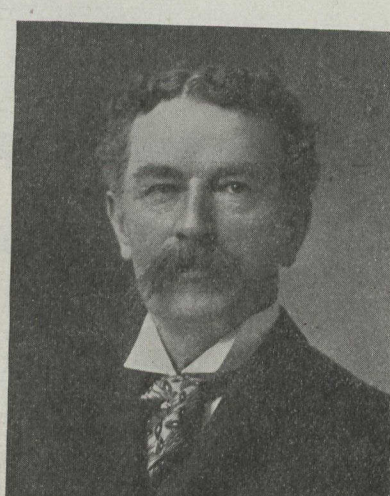
MR. MARTIN BURRELL (Con.),
Re-elected in Yale-Cariboo, B.C. His constituency is a trifle larger than the Maritime Provinces, or the British Isles. A fruit-grower at Grand Forks.



MR. ROBERT BICKERDIKE (Lib.),
Elected for the fourth time to represent St. Lawrence Division, Montreal. An ex-president of the Board of Trade, and an executive officer of several financial corporations.



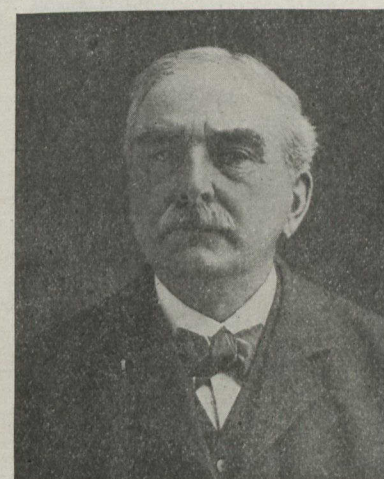
DR. E. L. CASH (Lib.),
Re-elected in Mackenzie, Sask. geographically one of the largest constituencies in Canada. Physically and mentally a typical Westerner.



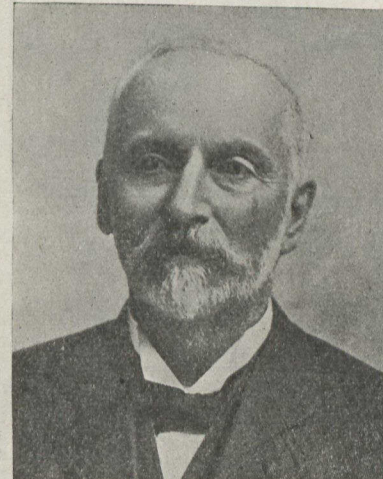
DR. JOHN W. DANIEL (Con.),
Elected in St. John City and County for the third time. An ex-Mayor of the city. A past president of the Council of Physicians and Surgeons.



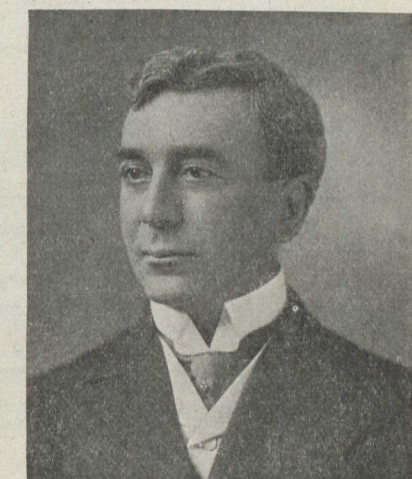
COL. SAMUEL HUGHES, M.P. (Con.),
Elected for the sixth time for Victoria County. President Dominion of Canada Rifle Association. Formerly publisher Lindsay Warder.



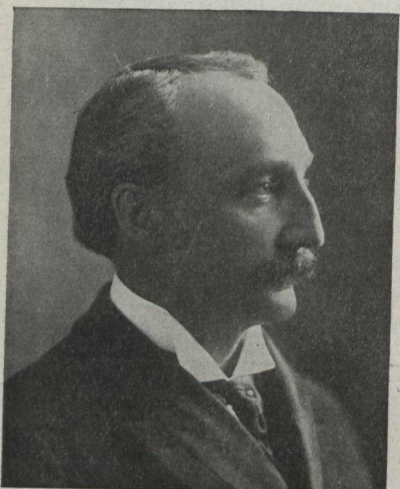
MR. WILLIAM SMITH (Con.),
A well-known farmer and stock-breeder who was elected in South Ontario. He represented that constituency from 1887 to 1896.



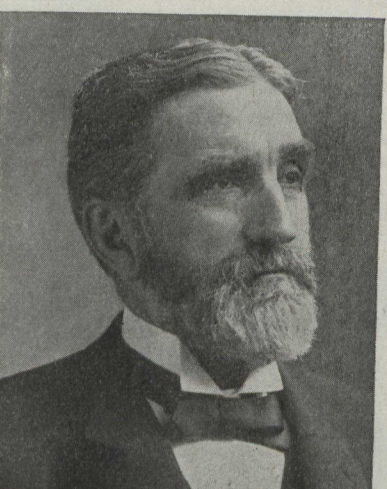
MR. ALEXANDER HAGGART (Con.),
Elected for the second time to represent the city of Winnipeg. He is a native of Peterboro', Ont., and a barrister.



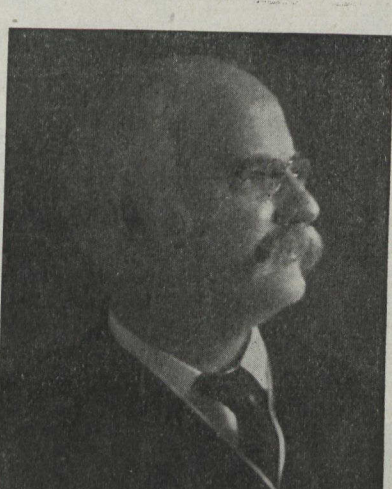
MR. A. CLAUDE MACDONELL (Con.),
Elected for the third time to represent South Toronto. A diligent parliamentarian and the Ontario whip. A barrister.



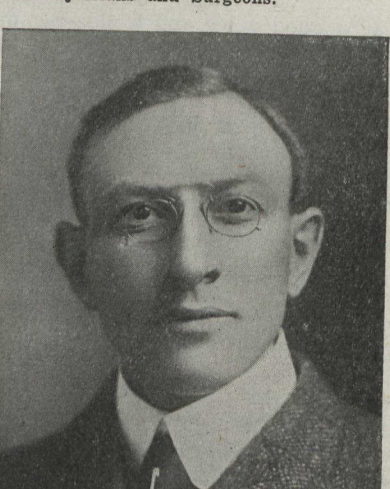
MR. FREDERICK D. MONK (Nat.),
Elected for the fifth time from Jacques Cartier. For a time he was Opposition leader for the Province of Quebec, but has recently been working independently.



HON. W. A. CHARLTON (Lib.),
Elected to represent Norfolk for the first time. He was formerly Speaker of the Ontario Legislature. A brother of the late Hon. John R. Charlton.



HON. CHAS. J. DOHERTY (Con.),
Elected for second time for St. Anne's Division, Montreal. Professor Civil and International Law, McGill University.



MR. EDGAR NELSON RHODES (Con.),
Re-elected for Cumberland, N. S. A lawyer at Amherst, and has been Conservative whip from the Maritime Provinces.



MR. DUNCAN C. ROSS (Lib.),
Elected for the second time in North Middlesex. A barrister at Strathroy. A son of Senator Sir George W. Ross, formerly Premier of Ontario.



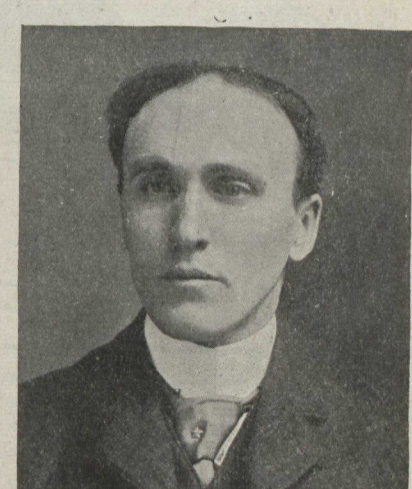
MR. WILLIAM S. MIDDLEBRO (Con.),
Elected for the second time for North Grey. A barrister. An ex-Mayor of Owen Sound. A younger member who has made a good record.



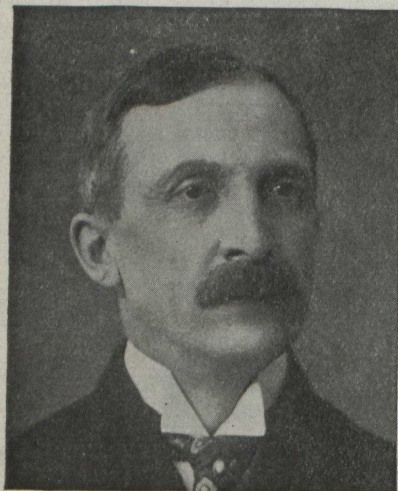
MR. FREDERICK F. PARDEE (Lib.),
Elected for the third time West Lambton. He has been chief whip of the Liberal party since 1909. A barrister at Sarnia.



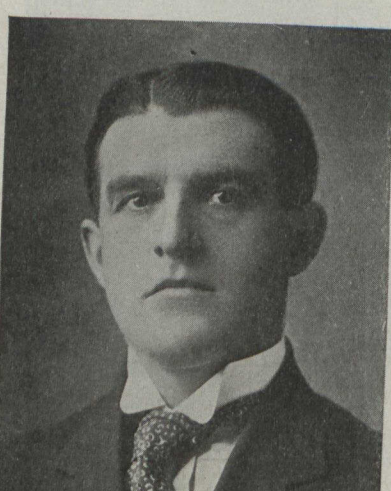
MR. ALBERT CHAMPAGNE (Lib.),
Re-elected to represent Battleford, Sask. Formerly a member of the Saskatchewan Legislature. Only French-Canadian representative west of Great Lakes.



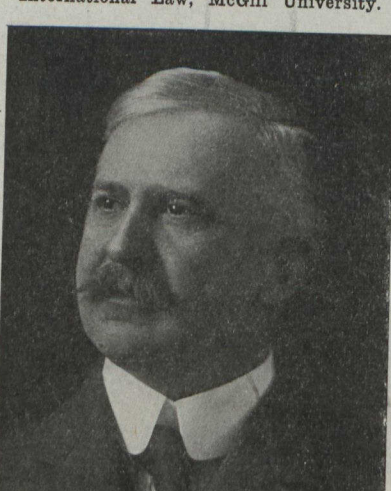
LIEUT.-COL. HUGH CLARK (Con.),
Resigned his seat in the Ontario Legislature to contest successfully North Bruce. Proprietor and editor of The Kincardine Review.



MR. ALFRED H. CLARKE (Lib.),
Elected for third time in South Essex. He was mentioned as a probable successor to Sir Alan Aylesworth as Minister of Justice. Bench of the Law Society. Resides at Windsor.



HON. WM. A. BUCHANAN (Lib.),
Who defeated Mr. C. A. Magrath in Medicine Hat. Recently member of the Rutherford Administration in Alberta. Proprietor of Lethbridge Herald.



MR. ALBERT EDWARD KEMP (Con.),
Re-elected for East Toronto after a three years' interregnum. He is a past president of the Toronto Board of Trade and of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.



MR. OSWALD S. CROCKETT (Con.),
Re-elected in York, N.B., for the third time. He is a prominent lawyer in Fredericton. Has been an aggressive fighter in the House.



SIR WILFRID LAURIER (Lib.),
Elected by acclamation in Quebec East, and also in Soulanges. First elected to Commons in 1874. Minister Inland Revenue 1877. Chosen Leader Liberal party 1887. Premier of Canada since 1896.



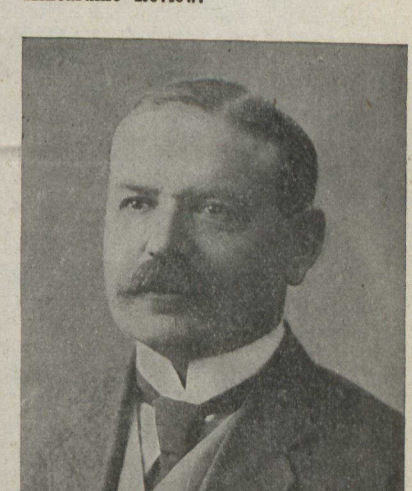
MR. ALFRED E. FRIPP (Con.),
Who, with Dr. Chabot, was elected in Ottawa, displacing two Liberals. Mr. Fripp resigned his seat in the Ontario Legislature to contest this election. A barrister.



HON. DR. HENRI S. BELAND (Lib.),
Postmaster-General. Re-elected for fourth time in Beauce. Two terms in Quebec Legislature. Residence, St. Joseph de Beauce.



MR. WILLIAM F. NICKLE (Con.),
Who succeeds the Hon. Wm. Hartly for the city of Kingston. He resigned his seat in the Ontario Legislature to contest this election. A barrister.



MR. EDWARD M. MACDONALD (Lib.),
Re-elected for the third time in Pictou. Served seven years Nova Scotia Legislature. A barrister. Has been repeatedly mentioned for promotion.
