Q Magog is your centre?

Q Do you think there are many of the Magog hands who would say they were not on strike at that time, but that they were out for some other reason?

A Oh, yes.

Q How about the strikers at St. Henry? Do you know when they were joined by any others?

A I don't know for sure what took place at St. Henry.

Q What about Montmorency? Did they go out there?

A No sir.

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
