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## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

MILK FOR CONDENSED MILK  
FACTORY.

1.—I am supplying milk to a condensed milk factory and would like to know the best kinds of feed to produce the largest quantity of milk at the least cost; the quality of the milk is no object. For feed I have hay of different qualities, bran, middlings, oats, barley, oat feed, turnips and mangels.

2.—Can you recommend a vegetable seed drill for sowing fertilizer at the same time as it sows the seed; one for field use that will sow two rows at a time?

3.—Are gasoline engines likely to come into general use for farm work? Are they better than steam power, burning coal or wood?—J. J. D., Halifax Co.

In reply to subscriber who asks about milk for condensed milk factory, would say that if silage is not prohibited and he has this at his command, I would recommend feeding about 30 to 40 pounds per day.

However as corn silage is not very common in N.S., he may not be able to get this. If he has mangels and mangel-worms, he would make a cut and mixed with pulped mangels about 12 hours before feeding. Give the cows all of this they will eat up and then give them the hay and mangels. I would add about 4 pounds of bran, 2 pounds of middlings, and 2 pounds of oats for each cow per day. This will give them a good amount of the meal according to the milk-flow, in case he finds the cows responding or not. If he can get gluten meal, or gluten feed, or oil-cake, he can use this. The best way to find this will help to maintain the milk-flow. Some good old straw or long hay may be given at noon if he has it. Professor of
