MONTRÉAL HOG MARKET

Montreal, Saturday, Sept. 26, 1908.—The
market for live hogs here is decidedly
firmer, with prices somewhat advanced
over those current a week ago. There
was a good demand for the offerings this
week, which sold freely at about \$7.50
per cwt. for selected lots weighed about
250 lbs.

EXPORT BUTTER AND CHEESE

Montreal, Saturday, September 26, 1908.—
The market for cheese has eased off con-
siderably during the week owing to lack
of orders from the rarer side, and prices
are being sagging in the country. The
markets all over the country have ruled
at various prices, ranging from 12c to
13c to 12 1/2c, the bulk of the goods
selling at about 12 1/2c per lb. Towards the
end of the week it was noted to be more
country from the other side, and it looks
very much at time of writing, as if we
are not going to get off buying in case
Dealers seem anxious to get in for a few
September at the best prices possible,
are afraid to put off buying in case of
another upward movement in prices.
As a consequence there is every indica-
tion of firm market ruling all over the
country with a possible upward movement
in prices. Reports from the country for the
week or three past have told us of a
great falling off in the supply of milk.
This is only beginning to make itself
apparent in the receipts of cheese into
Montreal, which this week has shown a
marked falling off. The receipts this week
total 54,000 boxes as compared with 62,000
boxes last week. It is not clear whether
the main factor in strengthening the mar-
ket.

The shipments have been light this week
owing to the fact that there have been
practically no steamers sailing from Mon-
tréal. The dry cargo and consequently
numerous forest fires have made the
weather so thick about the St. Lawrence
that it has been practically impossible for
the steamers to move up or down, and
most of the steamers have been several
days late in sailing. It is thought that
hence this week-end will not get away
until next week.

The market for butter is decidedly firmer
and prices have advanced, owing to the
increased demand from local dealers for
cold storage purposes, and also on ac-
count of the increased enquiry from the
other side, though it has not resulted in
much business.

Country markets are advanced and are
ruling this week at 3/4c to 25c a lb. an
advance of over 1/4c a lb over the week
previous.

MONTRÉAL PRODUCE TRADE.

Butter.—Prices of butter have been
marked up this week owing to the ad-
vance in the country, and dealers are
bringing 25c to 26c for choice creamery
prints with solids at 1/2c. Ordinary
prints is selling at 25c, and seconds at 24c
to 25c. Dairy is selling at 21c to 23c.

Eggs.—The demand for eggs has im-
proved somewhat and prices have been well
maintained in spite of the somewhat
heavier receipts. We quote selected stock
at 24c with No. 1 at 23c to 21c, and No.
2 1/2c, with a good demand at these
rates.

AYRSHIRE NEWS

The Canadian Dairyman and
Farming World is the official organ
of the Canadian Dairy Producers
Association, all of whose members
are readers of the paper. Members
of the Dairy Producers Association are
sent items of interest to Ayrshire
breeders for publication in this col-
umn.

A representative of The Dairyman and
Farming World who recently visited the
stock farm of Mr. Alex. Hume, of Menie,
Ont., Northumberland Co., was much in-
terested in his splendid herd of Ayrshire
cattle. The herd comprises 75 to 80 head,
nearly half of the animals having been
imported. Eleven males were imported
this year. Mr. Hume will make a strong
showing at the leading exhibitions this
autumn. He has a yearling bull and
two lead to Mr. E. B. Palmer of Nor-
wich; two heifer calves to the State Col-
lege of Wisconsin; a bull and a
cow to Lady Stewart, who gave 905 lbs. of
milk in 18 months; No. 3. McKie of Sault
Ste. Marie, a yearling bull to Angus
Grant of Moose Creek; a four year old
cow to J. H. Stark, of Lang; and bull
calves to Mr. Haggarty of Stirling, W. S.
Grills, of Campbellville, and Alex. Milne,
of Hoards Station, and W. James Camp-
bellford. Mr. Hume reports that purchas-
ers are paying more attention to the
greater interest than ever before in the
milk-producing qualities of the stock they
purchase. Interested purchasers almost
invariably inquire what the milk records
of the ancestors of the animals they pur-
chase are.

15,000 POUNDS OF MILK PER COW.

One of the greatest herds of Ayrshire
cattle in Great Britain is owned by Mr.
Thomas Clement, a member of the well-
known firm of Messrs. G. & J. G. G. of
Importers of butter and cheese. Mr.
Clement has been in Canada recently and
had a chat in Montréal with a repre-
sentative of the Dairyman and Farming
World. "My herd of 75 Ayrshire cattle
averaged over 10,000 lbs. of milk per cow,"
said Mr. Clement, "and the best cow in the
herd did not give less than that, but where
heifers gave over 8,000 lbs. of milk at their
first calving, and the best milkers of the
herd would have given 10,000 lbs. of milk had
they been matured. My herd bull is from
a dam with a record of 11,500 lbs. of milk
testing 4.5 per cent. I have a younger
bull from a dam that gave 930 lbs. of
milk testing 4.5 in 34 weeks, which was
being sold for \$100. My best cow, testing
5.1 per cent at the end of the test. One
of my yearling bulls is from a dam that
gave over 10,000 lbs. of milk during her
milkling period."

While talking with our representative,
Mr. Clement produced a note book in
which he has kept a complete record of
his animals. He showed the record of
a 2 1/2 year old heifer that had pro-
duced 4700 lbs. of milk in 2 1/2 years. This
old animal had given 5,200 gallons test-
ing 3.6 per cent. An animal of which he
said he was very proud, and which he
expects great things of, was a cow that
in 1925 gave 11,120 lbs. of milk test-
ing 3.8, in 1906, 11,550 of milk testing 3.5,
and in 1905, 11,500 of milk testing 3.6.
Mr. Clement believes that he has the
best herd of cattle from a milk producing
point of view in Scotland, and states that
the records of his animals show that
Ayrshire cows are capable of doing.
