Oregon.

Oregon City, situated on the right bank the Wallammette, the lower south branch the Columbia, is the most populous setment in the territory. It contains about 00 persons, mostly from different parts of e United States, who have struggled with e difficulties of their tedious journey, and e " mountain pass," in their emigration to is country. The remainder are mostly deendants of the Aborigines, who remain re for the purpose of procuring employ-ent from the whites, and catching sainon the falls of the river. The Catholics have large church and a nunnery in the city, but think they are not numerous comparativein the territory. The Baptists and Mests have each a place of worship. Also, e Congregationalists contemplate building church soon. Would there could be so uch piety and Protestant influence, as to iase away every system of error that finds apport in our community. There are two rotestant, and two Catholic schools in the lace; but the demand for Protestant teachrs is so great, that many children of Preestant parents are sent to Catholic schools.

There is one phenomenon here which I ave observed in no other country. While he snow and frost are seen on the ground, he grass grows green on the hills, the rees are budding, and the buds open nto green leaves. The most plausible theory which I have heard is, that, during the winter, in North latitude, the upper current in the atmosphere descends to the earth, in this region; while in the summer, the upper current communicates with the earth in a more Northern latitude, in which case we should receive the under current from the North - Correspondent of Zion's Herald.

Meeting of Open Convocation.

On Thursday last, the Convocation of the Toronto University was held in the City Hall, for the purpose of installing the Hea. P.B. de Blaquiere as Chancellor of the University. The Hall was densely throughd, the upper end being reserved for His Excellency as Visitor, with his suite, the Pro-Vice Chancellor, President, Professors, and other Members of the Convocation. The Chancellor was introduced and conducted to his place by Dr. Bovell. An address was delivered in Latin by the President, and responded to in the same language by his Excellercy. The Pro-Vice-Chancellor in resigning his trust into the hands of the Chancellor, delivered a short but excellent address. The Chancellor addressed the House for some time on a variety of topics connected with the University. Oceasionally the Chancellor was happy; but as a whole, his address fell below what we anticipated.

His Excellency the Governor-General followed in an address replete with beautiful imagery and lofty sentiment. We never listened to a superior oration. It was in the highest sense an eloquent one; and repeatedly elicited the warmest expressions of spprobation from the intelligent audience.
