HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To rid the kitchen of flies, close windows and boil a pint of water to which has been added 10 drops of carbolic acid vigorously for five minutes. Then raise windows and the flies that are not dead will fly out.

Remove grass stains from white gar-ments by soaking in kerosene, then wash-ing well with soap and warm water. If the stains are not had a little lard, rubbed on the spots, then washed in soap-

Acid fruit require an almost unlimited amount of sugar, much of which can be saved by stirring in before sweetening, a little soda—ac half teaspoonful to a quart of fruit.

Take lettuce as it comes from garden or store and put in an air-tight vessel with a little water in the bottom. Then when you wish to use it you will find many leaves which at first you would have thrown away, fresh and crisp. This is much better than putting on ice.

When buying stair, earpets provide at least half a yard longer than is actually required, to permit of changing the tread from time to time. When laying the carpet for the first time have the surplus half yard at the top. After the first time it is taken up, when relaying it pull it over the steps a few inches, and so on until the surplus half yard is all at the bottom. Then the carpet can be reversed and the process repeated with the result that some years will be added to the life of the carpet.


