its redemption, which could only be done by convening the Legislature, to authorize a Loan. The Committee therefore think that both policy and justice demand from the Legislature that e provision should now be made for the redemption of this Paper, before these evilse have risen to any height, and while the Credit of the Province will enable them to negociate a Loan upon better terms than could be effected should such evils as have been anticipated recur.
