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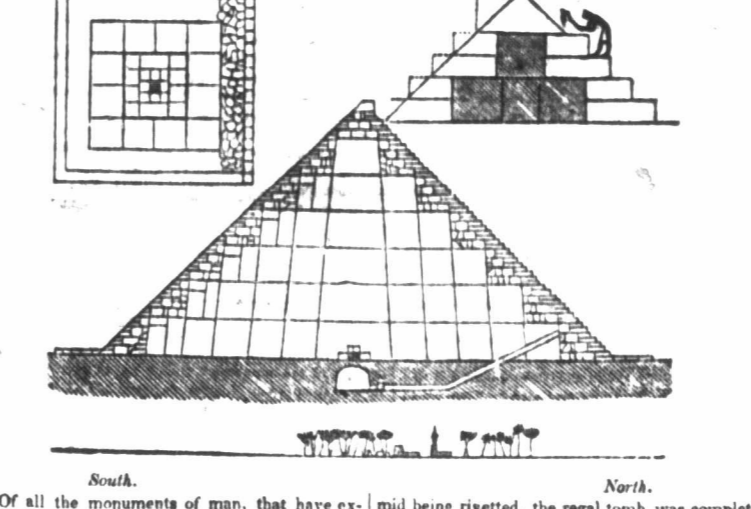
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HISTORICAL SKETCHES OF EGYPT. NUMBER 2. THE PYRAMIDS!

"The eternal Pyramids—What Monuments on Earth have given rise to more fables, speculations, errors, illusions, and misconceptions!"—(Gliddon's Chapters, 1843, p. 54.)



Of all the monuments of man, that have excited the wonderment of succeeding ages, the love of mysticism of modern writers, and the ardent investigations of modern times, there are none equal in interest to the Pyramids of Memphis.

They are situated on the rocky plateau that flanks the smiling valley of the Nile, along a line of about 56 miles from North to South, and covering a superficial breadth of perhaps a mile, these stupendous Mausolea have defied the ravages of 5000 years of time; and despite the devastations of the Caliphs, some 39 still proudly rear their heads north-westerly, and in actual condition, for nearly hidden by the debris and desert sand from the eye of the casual observer, are yet extant, on the Libyan coast, thus yielding an *striking* royal sepulchre in its actual condition; that practical investigations have repeatedly demonstrated, will be endeavor to place before our readers a few facts relative to the Pyramids, in which the affected Jon (in 14) longed to be at rest, with Kings and Counsellors of the earth, which built for themselves HARA M OTH, (Pyramids).

The first object that presents itself to the eye, on entering the interior of the Great Pyramid, is the central chamber, which is a rectangular block of stone, and is situated in the center of the pyramid. It is surrounded by a series of smaller chambers and passages, which are arranged in a regular, symmetrical pattern. The entire structure is built of massive blocks of limestone, which are joined together by a mortar of lime and sand. The pyramid is situated on a rocky plateau, and is surrounded by a low wall of masonry. The entrance to the pyramid is on the west side, and is reached by a long, narrow passage. The interior of the pyramid is a complex of chambers and passages, which are arranged in a regular, symmetrical pattern. The entire structure is built of massive blocks of limestone, which are joined together by a mortar of lime and sand.
