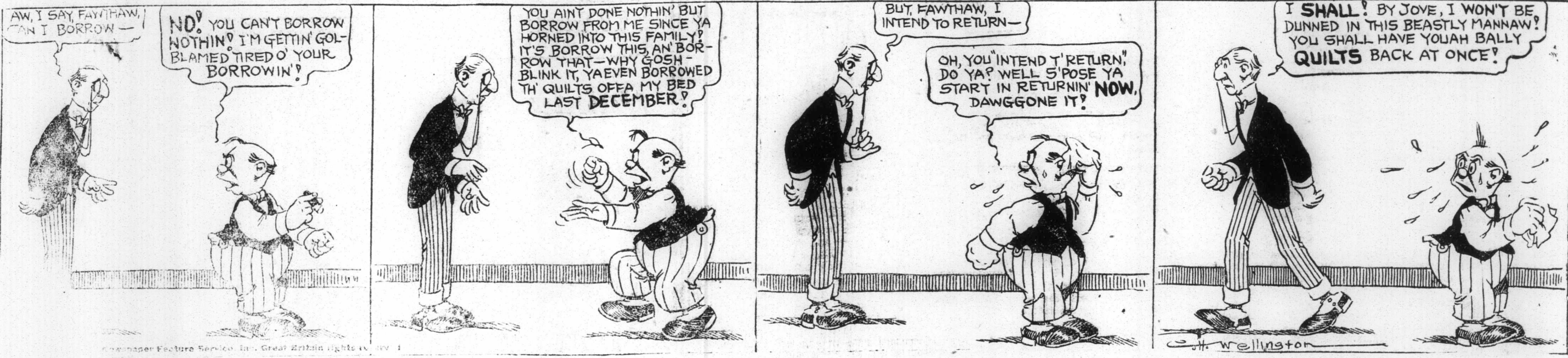

BRANTS PUT UP BRILLIANT BRAND OF BALL AND TROUNCE HAMS TO THE TUNE OF 5-3

Playing of Ivers Seemed to Inspire Both the Infield and Outfield—Had Not Worfel Had Such Excellent Support, He Would Probably Have Gone Under—Fried and Burrill Star.

Brantford got the first glimpse of the real Brant team yesterday, when the Indians routed their visitors, the Hams by a score of 5 to 3. It was truly a brilliant exhibition, showing what the boys are capable of when they get going.

Never has there been seen at the park, a game in which ginger was so prevalent and after a rattling line show of work, infield and outfield, Rube's gang went out with a flying finish, which added the last touch of color to a splendid exhibition.

THE CHANGES

With the inclusion of Gabby Ivers at first, the team seemed to get right into stride, every man thoroughly at home and there never was any doubt about the improvement effected. Foran had been shifted from the initial bag to right field. Burrill went into the centre garden and Green took care of the left. Dunn was taken out altogether and may be used behind the batter later.

Worfel was cool and kept his head although he was knocked eleven times. With the magnificent support tendered him, he got out of one or two tight holes luckily, especially in the eighth and ninth.

THE STAR

Fried was perhaps the stellar performer for his lightning stab in the ninth undoubtedly saved a run, while Burrill's peg to Lamond, from the outfield resulted in Linneborn being caught a few inches from the plate. Lamond demonstrated that he is a first-class backstop, for his work was admirable.

Although the Brants were outhit, they held the Hams down and what little luck there was seemed to be with them.

HITTERS

It can hardly be said that the Indians lack hitters now, for Burrill came across yesterday with three doubles and was caught once stretching a single. Foran, as usual came up with his timely knocks and was sent down once on strikes when the last heave was easily a foot wide. Ivers connected for singles and received a hand on his first time to the plate. Fried was there as usual and the only hitter who disappointed was Mike Mullin, who was twice struck out, once with bases full and only got to first on an error.

Bedford, the Umps, pulled off some raw decisions, but as they were evenly distributed, far be it from us to kick.

The result was a pretty fair reflex of the game and Rube deserves a little pat on the back for the general line displayed.

THE GAME

Brants opened the scoring in the second when Gabby started it with a single. Mullin was passed and Foran was retired on a bad decision. Fried grounded out, advancing the runners and Lamond stepped up with the necessary, whipping to the right fence for a two bagger, bringing two over. Worfel was out for first and the innings ended, one hit and two runs.

MORE FOLLOWED

They added another couple in the third when Schroeder walked a couple of men after Green had grounded out. With two on bases, Ivers drove hard to centre and filled the bases. Dunlop might have got in but the Brants were playing safe. With bases full, Mullin fanned. Foran, however, came to the rescue and singled to left and the walkers crossed the plate, leaving Ivers and Foran on the paths. Fried was out to first and the innings ended. Two hits and one run.

The Ambitious ones retired in order and Lamond started the fourth well with a hit which was not held by Westlake, going to second and stealing third on a bad catch when Green was in after Worfel had grounded out on an infield fly. Green fanned and Dunlop followed suit while Matty was held up and the run did not materialize.

HAMS DRAW BLOOD

Hamilton followed with a tally when Schroeder's fly was muffed, he going across on Harris' hit to left, who was caught stretching it into a three-bagger. Tiffany was forced at second and with Linneborn already out the Hamiltonians were retired.

Again the Indians got to Schroeder and filled the bases. Ivers going across from third in an overture, but being sent back to third. Fried walked after Foran had singled and the bases were full, but Lamond's swift grounder was prettily fielded by Cunningham and Schroeder got out of a tight corner.

Worfel, Dunlop and Ivers pulled off a great double play in the sixth when Pembroke sent into Worfel's mitt with Woods on the track for second.

ANOTHER TALLY

With two men down and Worfel safely on second, Burrill singled camping to centre, sending Worfel home. Burrill being caught trying to stretch his bingle into a double. One hit and one run. Hearing with lots of speed and curve, Worfel received splendid support and the Hams could make little impression upon the Brants. Cunningham's wild peg gave Foran a base, on which he improved, going to second on the overthrow. The error was covered up when Fried rolled out, Ivers and Mullin being already benched.

A TIGHT CORNER

The Hams got to Worfel in the eighth for three hits and two runs. Harris and Westlake singled and Tiffany accompanied them on the bases when he was struck. Cristall went in for Woods and succeeded in getting to first on a fielder's choice, forcing Westlake at second and sending Harris in Tiffany followed a second later on McGroarty's clout, Cunningham striking out and Pembroke being caught at second. Three hits and two runs, no errors.

A RALLY

With the ninth the Ambitious ones made a determined attempt to rally and Harris' bingle being only stopped by one of the most brilliant innings of fielding work and was advanced by Harris singling Schroeder, going out at first, after driving to short. Linneborn singled and was advanced by Harris singling. Westlake singled to centre field and Linneborn made for home, being caught by Matty, who received a magnificent peg from the outer garden by Burrill. With Tiffany up there was still danger for two men were on the bags. Knocking hard to centre, Fried jumped and held the pill, Westlake was nabbed at second and the Brants had won. It was a splendid finish to a hard fought and well won game, giving the fans a heart and a sight of the real team.
