Football is Source of Increased Revenue

Princeton, N. J., Feb. 11.—Football was a source of substantially increased revenue this year at Princeton, netting \$53,000 more than all the expenditures, according to the report of the Athletic Association. The report shows a total profit of \$15,129.73, a gain of \$5,500 over the revenue of the previous year. Football, baseball and hockey were the only sports to make money. Baseball made \$8,700 and hockey \$185.

Ask That Game

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—The Ottawa Hockey Club has telegraphed to President T. Emmett Quinn of the N. H. A. a protest in connection with the game, which they lost to the Canadiens at Montreal Wednesday night. In the event of President Quinn refusing to sustain their protest they will insist on a special meeting of the league to deal with it and to clear up other matters, now before the directors.

In Wednesday's game, Goldie Rodgers threw his stick in the second period and was only given a minor foul. He was only off for five minutes whereas the Ottawas claim he ought to have been banished for the balance of the game.

Producers cut down Capt. Horace Merrill, for which he was given a ten minute penalty. In this instance, the Ottawas maintain he should have been chased altogether, as his offence was as glaring as that of Ross and McNamara, who were sent off for

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the night after their fight in the third session. The Ottawas still have President Quinn's letters, which outline the stick throwing and deliberate foul penalties quite explicitly, and the champions will ask to have the match replayed.

Stone's Victory Only Brought Him a Dime

In the height of the excitement over Jess Wilard's contracting for something like \$50,000 for only ten rounds to a decision, a friend of Harry Stone, the New York welterweight, tells how Stone set a new record for boxing purses by fighting twenty hard rounds to a decision at New Orleans not so long ago for the munificent sum of one thin, hard dime. It's the gospel truth! Stone signed to box Pete Russell of New Orleans on a percentage basis. Harry posted \$100 as a forfeit for weight, and agreed to make 133 pounds ringside. Stone scaled at 137 1/2 when he stepped into the ring, and Russell very properly claimed the \$100. Stone then proceeded to beat his man in almost every round, and was awarded the decision. When they counted the receipts it was figured that Stone had \$100.10 coming to him. When Russell took his hundred Harry had that little dime above referred to.

Ted Meredith Makes Claim For New Record

New York, Feb. 11.—On the strength of his time of 59.45 seconds made in the 500-yard race at the New York Athletic Club games here Tuesday night, Ted Meredith, the University of Pennsylvania runner, will apply to the Amateur Athletic Union for the official record in that event.

At present there is no record on the books for 500 yards indoors. Meredith made what was believed to be the best time for that event last year, when he ran the distance in 1:00.15. The record for 500 yards outdoors is 57.35 seconds, made by Mel Sheppard.

They Liked Fred Herbert.

He pitched two fine games for the Giants toward the tail-end of last season. He won in St. Louis, but lost the last game of the season to the Dodgers. WHAT THE PERSONAL LIBERTY LEAGUE of Ontario Stands For!

IN response to the numerous inquiries regarding the aims and objects of The Personal Liberty League of Ontario, we append below a Declaration of Principles, which is self-explanatory. It will be seen from a reading of the Declaration that the League stands for the widest individual liberty compatible with effective government.

That there is pressing need for such a stand just now in Ontario cannot be denied. Constant inroads are being made upon personal liberty, and it seems to be the belief of many that the individual has no inherent rights which the majority are bound to respect, and that everything, however illusory, can be brought about by the mere passing of a law. The people of Ontario, indeed, are threatened with a real curtailment of their freedom, all, supposedly, in the interest of morality.

Declaration of Principles

"We are in favor of the proper observance of the Sabbath, but not of laws that restrict the right of the individual citizen to indulge in innocent amusements and harmless recreation on that day. We believe in the subordination of the interests of individual citizens to the interests of the community as a whole, but not in the curtailment of the personal rights and liberties of one class or party of citizens to satisfy the demands of another class or party who may desire to waive such personal rights and liberties for themselves.

"BELIEVING in the above principles, we declare our friendship and pledge our support to men and measures that stand for the self-evident justice of these principles, and we declare our opposition to men and measures that favor sumptuary or restrictive legislation.

"WE BELIEVE in temperance in all things, and in its promotion; we favor the license system under proper regulation and control, but we are opposed to prohibition or any legislation which encroaches upon or curtails the purely personal liberties of our people."
